
They Shoot! — They Score!

Young Hoopsters Compete at Annual Basketball Tournament

Pass — dribble — shoot — get that rebound. All the fast-paced excitement of a basketball game will echo off the walls of the Claremont Savings Bank Community Center (CSBCC) and Stevens High School gymnasiums as the annual Twin State Valley (TSV) Basketball Tournament kicks off today. Multiply the ex-

citement of one game by the more than 80 to be played by 43 teams, and you'll definitely want to stop in and cheer on your favorites.

Justin Martin, our Parks & Rec superintendent of recreation programs, is the tireless organizer of the tournament. He reaches out to coaches and their teams, handles registra-



The tournament, which is in its 72nd year, runs every day from this evening through Saturday, March 9. The format is double-elimination, which means that every team is guaranteed to play at least two games. Players compete for the championship in six divisions: 3/4

boys, 3/4 girls, 5/6 boys, 5/6 girls, 7/8 boys, and 7/8 girls.

Claremont's own Mini-Cardinal all-star teams will take on other local competitors, many of whom belong to the 18-member Upper Valley Recreation Association. You'll also see youngsters from Hanover, Windsor, Cornish, Enfield, Lebanon and Woodstock in action.

Games are played at the CSBCC and Stevens High School. Admission is only \$1 per person per day. With so many parents, families, teachers and classmates filling the bleachers, we plan to be packed once again this year!

The CSBCC has quickly become the venue of choice for the TSV event.

Jason Beeman of Claremont has two sons who have played basketball in our program for years. Beeman currently coaches a 5/6 boys basketball team, and has coached many teams in various sports for the Department. "I really like that we get to have a tournament in

our home gym," he says. "And for the younger kids in the 3/4 division, it's a fun way to end the season."

Coaches from around the region are just as enthusiastic about playing at the CSBCC.

"We always look forward to the TSV Basketball Tournament, and this will be our fourth year coming up to Claremont

from Hopkinton," says coach Ken "Skate" Murdough. "Justin and the crew put on a great tournament and the facility is excellent. All the parents wish that we had a center like the CS-BCC! The TSV basketball games are always very competitive and well refereed. All our players seem to get a lot out of this tournament."

In addition to the trophies that the winning teams take home, five awards are presented at the conclusion of the tournament. The Sportsmanship Award is given to the player who shows respect for his or her teammates, TSV games are played at the Claremont Savings Bank Community Center (CSBCC) and Stevens High School (SHS).




Salt of the Earth

We've heard the phrase often enough, but do we really know its origin and what it means? Many will recognize its earliest use which was by Jesus of Nazareth as he preached to the crowd on the mountain (The Sermon on the Mount). During the Middle Ages it became commonly used to describe a wholesome, fair-minded person who will be ready to help others; a generally fair, good person.

We use it to describe someone at a memorial service, maybe. Perhaps we might use it in a court to make sure the judge or jury knows that this person is really a good soul. In speaking of a friend whom we knew years ago, we might say, "Archie and Edith were the salt of the earth. You won't know any more about Archie and Edith except that I hold them in high esteem.

I was visiting a daughter recently and she had on her coffee table a book called "Salt cooking with the world's most popular seasoning" by Valorie Aikman-Smith. As we grow older were told to watch our salt intake, so naturally, I liked the idea of this book and decided to read it right then and there. What an awakening. My ideal is salty French fries, onion rings, popcorn - you know the routine. I was surprised to learn that



there are 11 kinds of salt used in cooking and such a variety of uses. There are salt types from Rock salt to Hawaiian black lava sea salt, to flavored salts. There are so many more ways of using salt other than sprinkling on French fries, onion rings and popcorn.

I had heard of salt-encrusted fish. In fact, I had it once in Greece -delicious. I never tried it, though. She describes salt crusted chicken. Also salt crusted leg of lamb. The chicken and fish are coated with salt and it needs to cover the fish or chicken entirely so that the steam can't escape. It must result in a very moist meat or fish. The lamb has flour mixed with the salt which makes a real crust and again results in a very moist leg of lamb.

Are you hungry yet? The book goes on with recipes for all eleven kinds of salt from meats and fish to Parmesan chips; don't they sound delicious?

I really didn't intend this to be an article about cooking, just wanted to make you, dear reader, hungry! My intent was to think about how we can maintain the salty flavor of our lives so that we don't lose our flavor, as Jesus suggests. We all can be the salt of the earth. We all can be good people who help our neighbors at home or across the waters. It isn't always easy, though. Sometimes life gets in the way. We forget that our children are learning to play the game. They aren't pros yet! We forget that the young woman at the register might be at the end of her second shift and tired because she has to work two jobs to provide a roof for her disabled husband and their child. We might forget that the man who cut in front of us on the road is on his way to the hospital to see his wife who is dying.

These are the times when our salt loses its flavor. Mostly they're forgivable because maybe we're tired or hungry or upset. The secret is to remember that we all deserve kindness from others. We find that when we're kind others will be kind to us too. What a lovely image that brings to our world.

"You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its flavor, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled on by people."

With the recent loss of The Monkees' Peter Tork, this journalist was sent into a bit of an emotional tailspin, as The Monkees were and are one of my all-time favorite groups. I grew up in an era of some of the greatest talents in the Entertainment Industry, and this world has lost so many of these wonderful men and women that I had to do a review of a different kind in honor of those lost and in thanks to those we still have.

In the 60's through the 80's, and a few in the 90's, there were men and women in entertainment who have touched this world in ways that most of us never will. When phrases use your name in them, you know you've got something, and these are merely a few who can own that accolade... the best of the best.

As glamorous as their lives seem, they are all just people like us, some more so than others, and it's not all glitz. The work they do takes them from loved ones for long periods at a time. They have no privacy. They are often lied about, stalked, and even threatened. People assume they know who these figures are just because the work they do puts them in the public eye. We see how they walk, how they talk, how they move, and many people believe that through their mannerisms and their work, it means we fully know who they are. This illusion leads many to feel a personal connection with them, and it removes all sense of personal boundaries for those who feel that way. The familiarity it brings to such people in regard to their view of celebrities can be unhealthy and even dangerous for the celebrities in question. It's not always as harmless as an infatuation and can lead to false claims of inappropriate conduct at best and stalking or assault at worst. In this way, living in the public eye can be dangerous for the celebrity and his or her family.

Let's thank those who live in the public eye for all they give of themselves today. It's not always easy, no matter how easy it may look. Sadly, no one can live forever. At least, not in this world. Not even these ordinary men and women who have achieved success, who inspire us in countless ways, and who we see as extraordinary. Yet, through their work and, in many cases, their charitable deeds or devotion to family, they have changed the world and will live on forever in our music, in our films and programs, and in our hearts.
