The Stevens boys basketball team concluded their season with a pair of games this past week. ON Tuesday evening they took on the Souhegan Sabers and on Senior night hosted the Kearsarge Cougars.

Souhegan had an easy time of it versus Stevens as they rolled to a 70-23 victory. Matt Jones paced the Cardinals with 7 points. Quentin Bicknell had 6 points and 6 rebounds. Gabe Miller scored 4 points and Owen Taylor chipped in with 4 points while hauling down 8 rebounds.

On Friday night, Stevens recognized the Spirit team seniors, Hailey LaClair, Amelia Parizo, & Leeann McCarthy for their contributions to Stevens athletics over their 4 years. The boys basketball team recognized seniors Ethan Johnson, Matt Szelangowski, Derrick Stanhope, Josh Stithen, and Anthony Abella for their 4 years in the program. At half-time the Stevens Bowling team was honored for bringing home their first Division I State Championship.

As for the game, the Cougars would go on to win the game 55-36. The seniors acquitted themselves quite well as Ethan Johnson had a team high 9 points. Josh Stithen had 8 points, Der-

rick Stanhope had 7 points and 6 rebounds. Matt Szelangowski chipped in with a basket, and Anthony Abella, making his varsity debut also had 2 points, while grabbing 4 rebounds.

The varsity boys concluded the season with a 1-17 record.

The JV boys also played Souhegan on Tuesday night and they dropped a 49-26 decision to the Sabers. Cooper Moote scored a team high 14 points. Dylan Chambers added 5 points and a team high 7 rebounds.

In the Friday night finale, Kearsarge earned a 53-27 victory. Reeve Wilkinson had a team high 8 points. Dylan Chambers scored 6 points, Brady Moote scored 5 points with 7 rebounds, and Caden Ferland chipped in with 4 points and 5 rebounds.

The junior Cardinals concluded their season with 4-14 record.

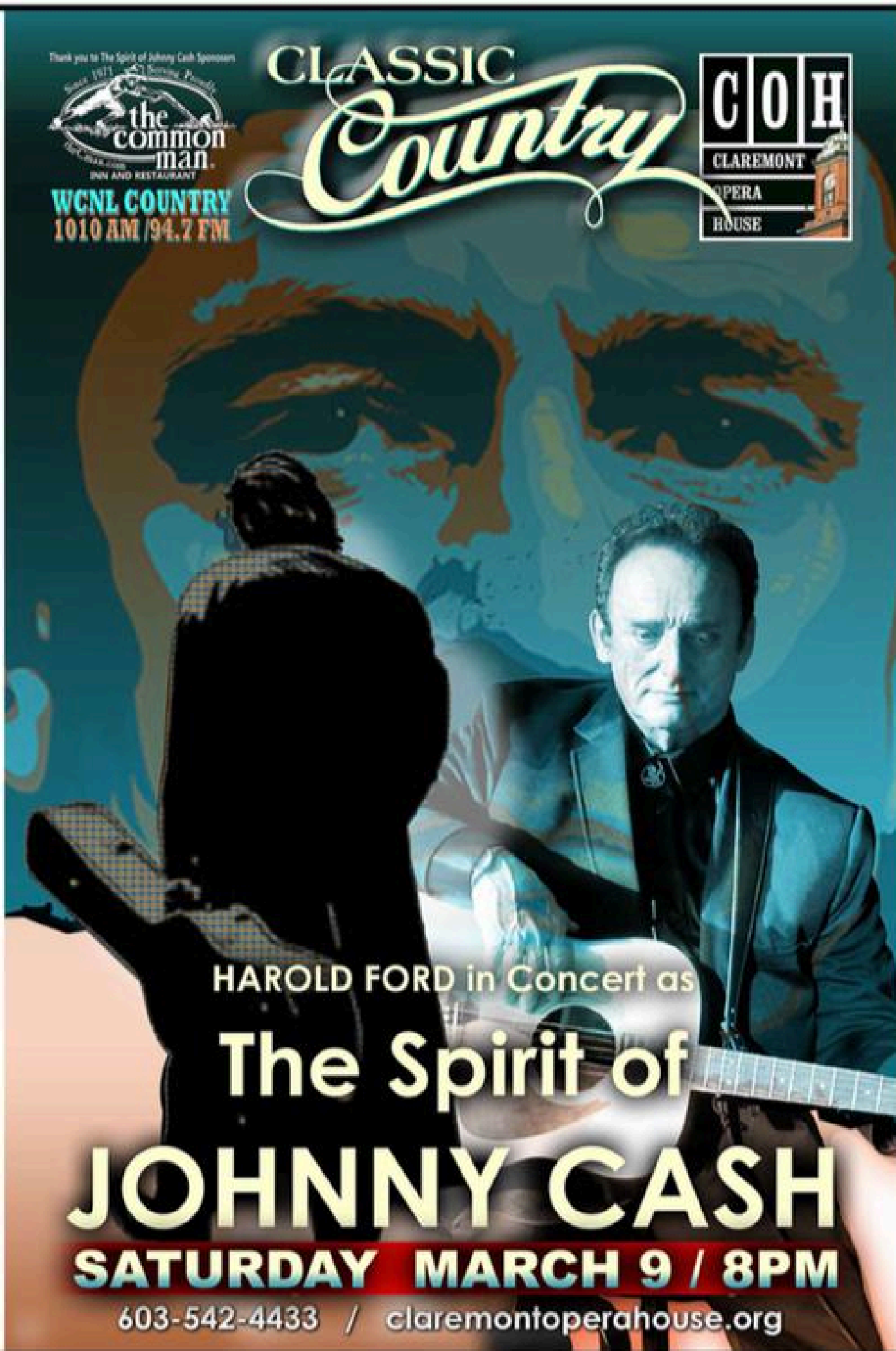
