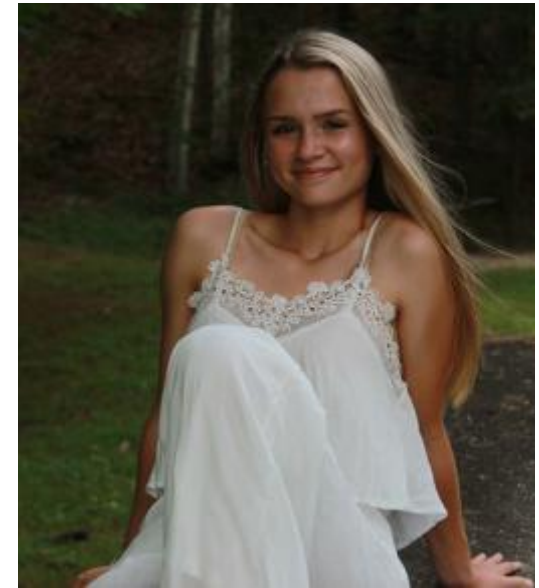

Claremont teams win 4 of 6 divisions at TSV Basketball Tournament

CLAREMONT, NH—After two weeks of exciting, often nail-biting games, four Claremont teams emerged as champions in this year's Twin State Valley basketball tournament. They topped grade divisions 7/8 boys, 7/8 girls, 3/4 boys and 3/4 girls. In addition, the 5/6 girls team were runners-up.

The players fed off the cheers and applause of many hometown spectators. An estimated 3,000 family members, friends and fellow students — from Upper Valley towns to as far away as Hopkinton — filled the gymnasiums at the Claremont Savings Bank Community Center and Stevens High School to watch 43 teams play 80 games over the course of the tournament. Bleachers quickly filled up, making for several SRO crowds.

The winners took home trophies, special awards — including Most Valuable Player, Unsung Hero and Sportsmanship — and champion logo shirts. They also carried away memories, lessons in teamwork, and new friendships to last a lifetime. **(See additional photos, B2).**

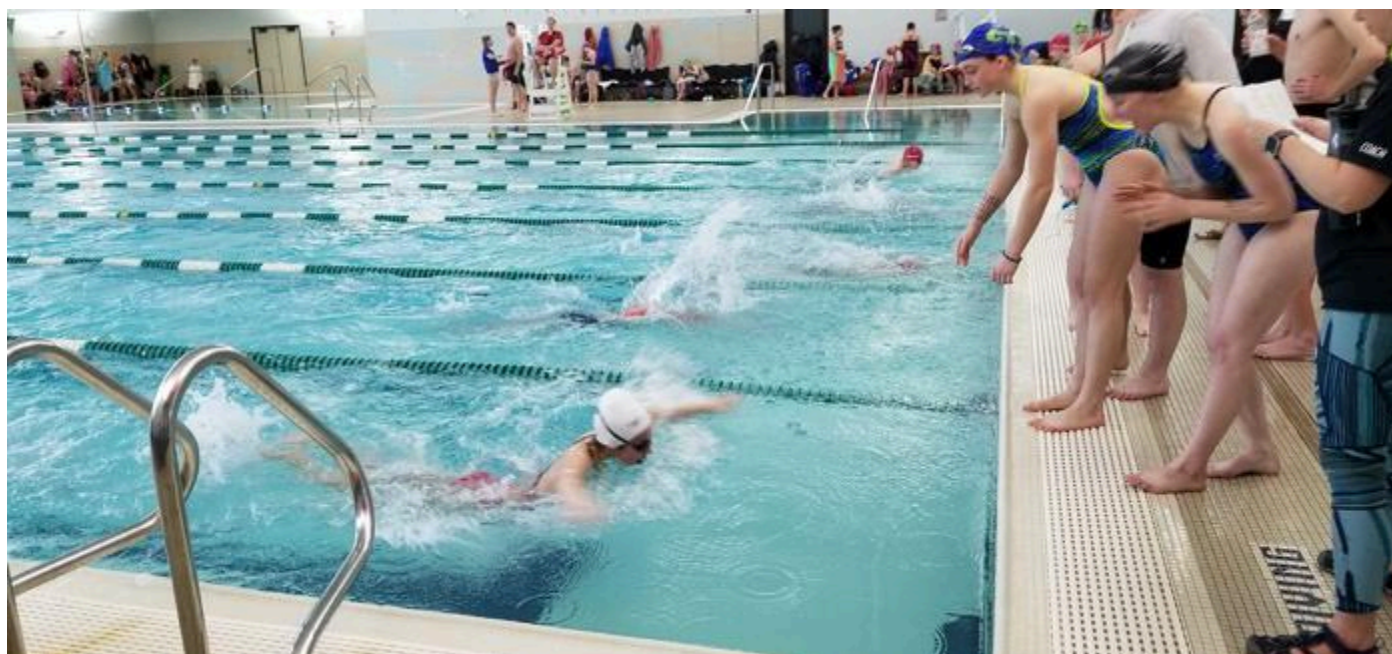

Scouting

March is Girl Scout Month. The founder of Girl Scouts in America, Juliette Low, celebrated her birthday in March, and so we celebrate the founding of this great movement of scouting. I spent about 15 years in Girl Scouts, as a Girl Scout for 10 and Leader for about five. I enjoyed every minute of both roles.

I don't want to leave out the other great movement for youth and that is Boy Scouts. I was involved in Boy Scouts for two years as a Cub Scout den mother. That was another great time and I loved both. For a couple of years I was a Den Mother on Monday and a Girl Scout Leader on Thursday! I tell you this, not to say look at what I did, but to emphasize that the two groups are compatible. Of course, the founder of Boy Scouts in America was Chicago publisher, W.D. Boyce.

Boy scouts have their Eagle Scout awards and as Cadets, in Girl Scouts we also became involved in service positions, spending time to help others in some special way. My choice was going to a local nursing home and helping the folks there. Sometimes it was reading to people, or feeding a snack to someone, sometimes just sitting by the bed, holding the hand of a confused elderly person. Whatever the task, I always knew it was in some way helping them.

As a Girl Scout, I went to shows and museums in nearby New York City, we went camping from Center Moriches on the far eastern point of Long Island, New York, where we got up early in the morning and tossed horse shoe crabs back into the ocean, to camping in the Adirondack Mountains of New York to the Delaware Water Gap in New Jersey. We worked in all of these situations, but we always had fun. There was always singing and games mixed in with the work to keep us happy.

With the Cub Scouts, I remember the most important thing was the Soap Box Derby. These young boys built their own little race cars and then we had a track which they raced against each other. I'm sure to the boys it seemed like a huge task, but it taught them how to be successful at completing a task, sanding, painting, attaching the wheels and seeing the car finish the course!

Thinking about these groups, I wish all kids could be a part because I think that the biggest thing to learn at a young age is that no matter what your task is, you are the one in charge and how you do your assigned job makes a difference, not only to you, but to those around you. If you are assigned the task of collecting twigs for kindling, your job is no less important than the one assigned to splitting logs for the fire. You can't have a fire without kindling (twigs), and you can't have a fire without logs. So if your job is collecting kindling, do the best that you can so that the fire will start small, and grow into the best fire possible!

Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, both can make a difference in not only the Scouts but the people they serve. It helps young people look at the world in a different way, we hope. Instead of saying, "What can I get out of this time." The Scout learns to say, "How can I give of myself to help in this situation."

What to do if you face a stress interview

Ask your own questions

One of the most common traits of a stress interview is the hiring manager asking a lot of questions in rapid succession. You can counteract that effort by posing questions of your own, seeking to clarify what the interviewer is asking. This may help put them on the defensive themselves and will certainly give you a little more time to think of a good response.

Answer with stories

If you're generally quick on your feet, it's a good idea to take a while with your answers, tying them into past work experience. The Balance noted. This will not only slow down the pace of the interview, but also help present you as being more at-ease with the process. However, if you go this route, try to make sure your stories relate to the question at hand in some way, and have a general point to them.

Be open and honest

If, for instance, you find the questions are coming a bit too fast and furious, or are about something you don't really want to discuss (such as the particular circumstances around leaving a job), you can just say so.

Feel free to walk away

If this interview style is a complete surprise and it's making you truly uncomfortable, you don't have to sit there and endure it for an hour or more. Monster advised. You can just thank the interviewer for their time and leave.
