

SHS Girls Soccer Team Goes to 10-0-1

The Stevens Lady Cardinals Soccer team traveled to White Mountains and came away with a 1-0 victory on Monday, Sept. 30.

Stella Lavertue scored 30 seconds into the first overtime period off an assist from Tanner Brown.

With a record of 10-0, on the line, Stevens hit the road on Oct. 5. The team traveled to Kearsarge for Homecoming with the game ending in a 2-2 tie. The full 80 minutes were played as well as two ten minute overtime periods.

Kearsarge scored in the 1st half within the 19th minute to go up 1-0. Kearsarge then scored in the 2nd half within the 25th minute to make it 2-0.

However, Stevens would not give up and a hard run down the right side of the field by Stella Lavertue led to Stevens 1st goal of the game, off an assist from Tanner Brown.

Stevens then scored again when Angelina Leclair put a loose ball in the back of the net within the 9th minute.

Stevens is now 10-0-1 and will travel to Fall Mountain on Oct. 8.

Plan Ahead—Open Snowmobile Registration Weekend Is March 6-8

CONCORD, NH – The foliage is peaking in parts of the Granite State, which means it's time for snowmobile enthusiasts nationwide to start planning for New Hampshire's Open Snowmobile Registration weekend. From Friday, March 6 through Sunday, March 8, 2020, riders from throughout New England, as well as those from all around the U.S. and Canada, will have the opportunity to explore the over 7,000 miles of picturesque trails New Hampshire has to offer snowmobilers.

During the three-day Open Snowmobile Registration Weekend, sleds legally registered to ride in other states and provinces will be able to operate on New Hampshire's trails. All New Hampshire laws and regulations regarding the operation of snowmobiles will be enforced including speed limits, carrying signed landowner permission letters, compliant exhaust systems relative to noise and decibel levels, and youth operation standards.

"This weekend is one of the highlights of the winter for many resident and non-resident riders," said N.H. Fish and Game Captain Michael Eastman, who coordinates Snowmobile and Off-Highway Recreational Vehicle enforcement, registration, and safety education for the New Hampshire Fish and Games Department's Law Enforcement Division. "It's a great opportunity for residents and visitors alike to explore some of the most beautiful parts of the state that can be most easily accessed by snowmobile in the winter."

Open Snowmobile Registration weekend will happen annually each March, and New Hampshire resident snowmobile enthusiasts should look to other New England states and Canadian provinces for similar Open Snowmobile Registration weekends in January and February of 2020.

their first series getting a 65 yard touchdown run from Brodie Mulligan, and after the conversion attempt was wide right, the game was tied 6-6.

Stevens would take a second quarter lead, on a 2 yard Keaghan McAllister run. Owen Taylor connected with Quentin Bicknell for the two point conversion to make it 14-6 Stevens at the half.

Both teams played outstanding defense throughout the second half, before Stevens would cap an 83 yard drive on a 12 yard touchdown run by McAllister. The big play on the drive was a 53 yard connection from McAllister to Lucas Mudge. The extra point was no good but Stevens had a 20-6 lead with just 5:15 remaining.

Kearsarge moved the ball downfield but Owen Taylor ended any Cougar comeback hopes with an interception. Stevens would run out the clock to earn a big Division III win. McAllister also had a big night defensively recording a game high 11 tackles. Quentin Bicknell recorded 10 tackles, followed by Braxton LeBlanc's 9 tackles, while Hunter Christian and Matt Jones chipped in with 6 tackles each. Hunter Paradis and Tucker Derosier played great games from their defensive end positions setting the edge all night, and making big plays when it counted. Derosier also had an interception. McAllister rushed for 80 yards on 23 carries and in doing so topped 3,000 yards rushing in his high school career.

The Cardinals will return home for a Friday Night contest with the Laconia Sachems.

Intended for landowners, conservation groups, and natural resource professionals, the objective of Trails for People and Wildlife is to help readers facilitate the placement of thoughtfully located networks of well-maintained trails that help people get outside while minimizing wildlife disturbance. Drug Take Back Day is Saturday, October 26th

SUNAPEE, NH—On Saturday, Oct. 26, the Town of Sunapee will once again be participating in the National Prescription Drug Take-Back campaign, the Drug Enforcement Administration's nationwide effort to take back prescription drugs. Medicines that are no longer needed but remain in home cabinets are highly susceptible to misuse and abuse, including theft.

Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are increasing at alarming rates, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. In addition, many people do not know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them away or simply throwing them away – both potential safety and health hazards. 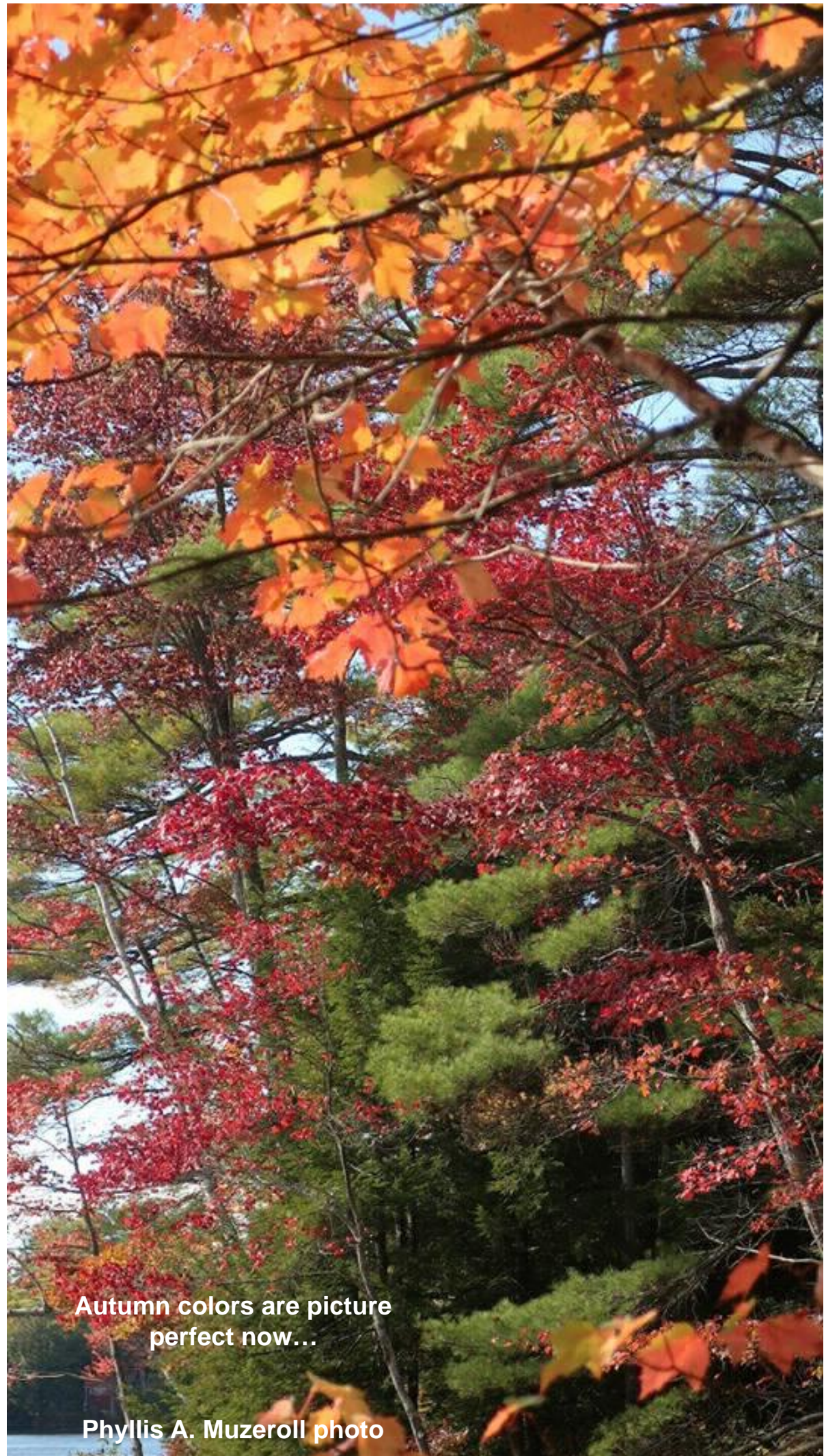

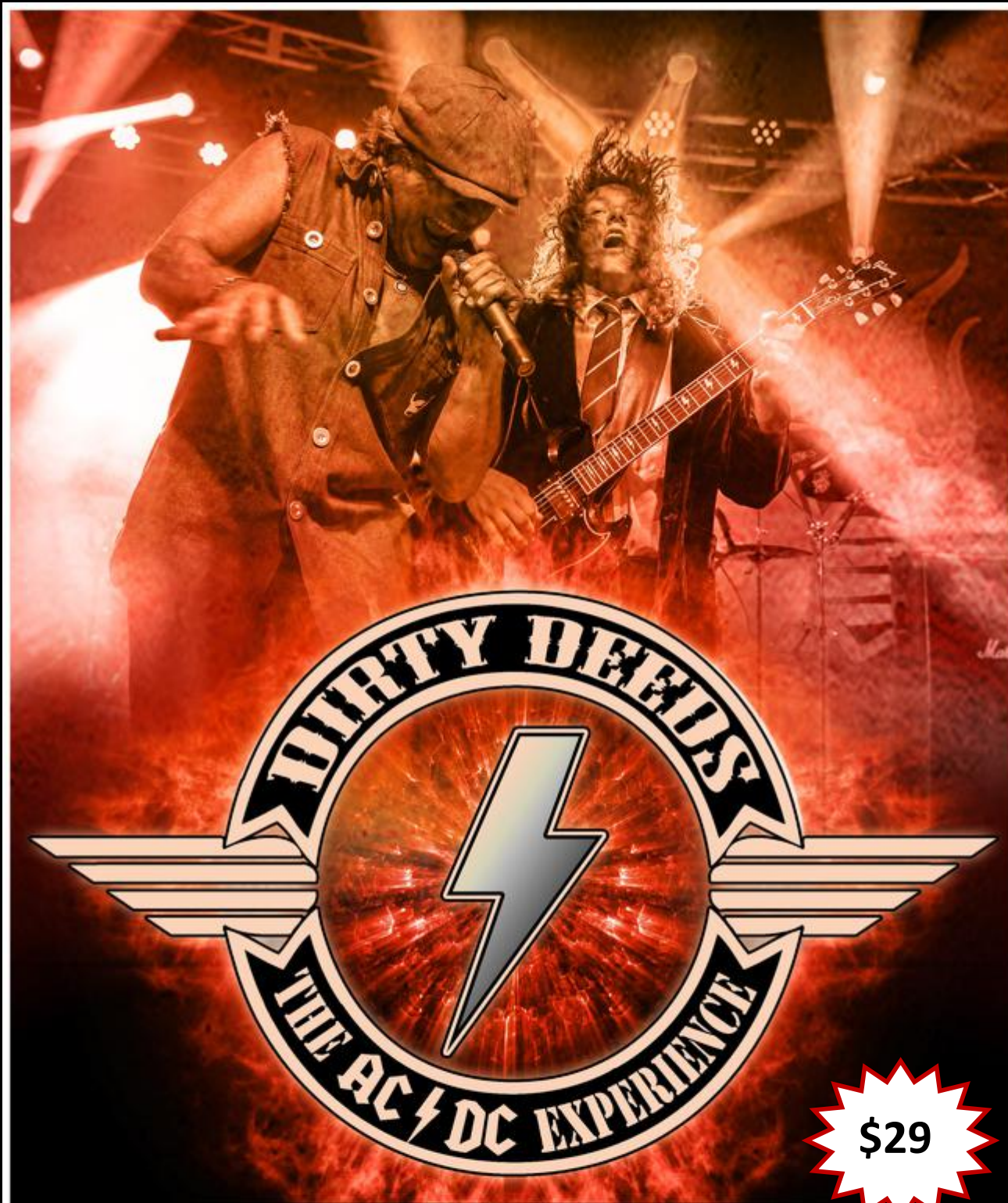

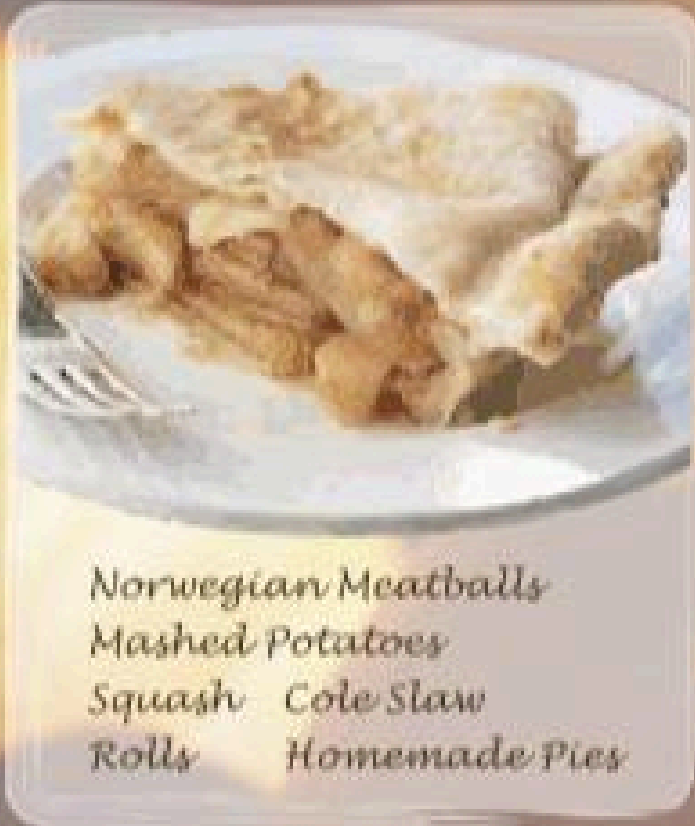
