

SHS Girls Soccer Have Split Week as They Drop their First Game of the Season

The Stevens Lady Cardinals Soccer team played at Fall Mountain in the Annual Charity Cup Tuesday and came away with a 3-0 victory.

Elle Grenier scored the first goal of the game in the 29th minute to put Stevens up 1-0. Stevens would score again 8 minutes later when Elle Grenier found Angelina Leclair at the top right corner of the 18 yard box who then drilled a shot in the right upper 90 to make it 2-0.

Stevens came out in the second half controlling the ball and within 2 minutes Molly Derosier crosses the ball from the left wing finding Sydney Miller who headed it in to make the score 3-0.

Stevens played a dominant game, moving the ball well, finding the open players, and playing strong defense.

This made Stevens 11-0-1 as it prepared to host Hopkinton on the 10th. The Red Birds would go on to lose, 2-0, recording their first loss of an exciting season.

Stevens is now 11-1-1 and will travel to Monadnock on Tuesday.

Sign Up for OHRV/Snowmobile Safety Classes

CONCORD, NH — Winter is on its way, and off-highway recreational vehicle (OHRV) and snowmobile education classes are underway across the Granite State. To operate a snowmobile or OHRV in New Hampshire, any person age 12 or older must have either a valid motor vehicle driver's license or have successfully completed an approved OHRV/Snowmobile Safety Education class taught by volunteer instructors and staff trained by the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department. With recent changes to the state laws, all classes will be a combination course teaching OHRV and snowmobile safety and the rules that apply to trail riders. Additionally, all children under the age of 14 must be accompanied by a licensed adult when operating a snowmobile or OHRV, unless they are on property belonging to their parents, grandparents, or guardians.

Sign up soon if you or someone you know needs a class. There is no charge for traditional classes, which are completed in a single



day. For a current class schedule, visit www.wildnh.com/ohrv/education.html. New classes are added as they become available. Traditional classroom OHRV and Snowmobile safety education courses, taught by nearly 150 Fish and Game-certified volunteer instructors and regional coordinators, are available statewide free of charge and offer the preferred method of certification.

As an alternative to the traditional courses, participants may complete the safety training online for a fee of \$29.50. "The online courses provide a convenient opportunity for students to obtain their NH Rider Certificate, at their own pace, while learning key safety information important for riding both OHRVs and snowmobiles," said Captain Michael Eastman, OHRV/Snowmobile Education and Law Enforcement Coordinator for the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department. "The entire course can be taken on a smartphone, tablet, or computer and offers



a fun approach to learning by using live-action video and interactive learning modules."

Many of the trained volunteer instructors are affiliated with one of the more than 100 snowmobile clubs and 26 OHRV clubs in New Hampshire. "Joining a club is a great way to learn about safe riding, help support local landowners, and help maintain trails for your own and others' enjoyment," Eastman said. In addition to safety education, Fish and Game Conservation Officers will be out on the trails this winter conducting patrols to detect and apprehend impaired snowmobile operators, enforce speed limits, deter unlawful off-trail riding, and detect machines with modified exhaust.

These ongoing initiatives will help to keep the state's snowmobile trails open and safe for all outdoor enthusiasts during the upcoming seasons.

IN 1492

"IN 1492 Columbus sailed the ocean blue" is the opening line in a poem that many of us learned as children to help us remember history. There are, in fact, a couple of versions of this poem that start with that line. One speaks to Columbus' discovery of a new world. The other is a ritual of American history citing various events in the history of our country. We do know that Columbus never set foot in what is now the United States, rather he did land in the Bahamas and other southern areas of Central and South America. We also know that he was from Italy, Genoa, to be exact, but his sailings were funded by the Spanish/Castilian monarchy. There is some evidence that the boy, Christopher, actually left home to become involved in ships at the tender age of 10! At that age, he apparently sailed northward to England and other European ports. His goal as an adult sailor, of course was to find a "quick" passage to the East and a trade path for spices and oriental art work which were so desired by Europe.

Christopher Columbus' later history is pretty shady, including his disregard for those whom he captured in the new world and his ignominious attitude toward them. He is said to have contracted syphilis and spread it to the New World, but also succumbing to its devastating, murderous effects of insanity and death.

All these unpleasant memories aside, he did open the New World to settlement by Europe and so we do celebrate the discovery of the Western World. Thus, today is a holiday for many.

When Columbus came to the New World, he established a route to new, beautiful lands which were inhabited by some of the kindest, gentlest, most beautiful people. These indigenous people were mistakenly called Indians after the colonies of the west, including India. Never mind the misnomer, the Indians up and down the coast for centuries to come, for the most part, offered their knowledge of survival to these strange white men. However, the newcomers didn't respect the land as the natives did. The natives were nomadic, traveling from one area to another with the seasons. Spring and summer they planted corn, squash and other crops and so lived in more flat, plain areas where farming was efficient. In the fall and winter they used the plants which they had dried for food and also hunted birds and game which also were dried for use in the summer seasons. They also moved into more wooded areas where there was protection from the elements. They built shelters from where they could stay warm and dry both from vegetation and skins. As they moved from place to place, they left little evidence that they had been there.

It was an economic, simple life where things were taken from "Mother Earth" and returned to "Mother Earth" to nourish the ground which they honored. "I realize the Earth is our mother. I will treat her with honor and respect." I don't know where this originated, but it has been a part of Native American life for centuries. We would do well to remember that. The earth does not belong to us, we use it and if we want to continue to use it, we should heed the teachings of those whom we have displaced so that we have a world for generations to enjoy!

Drug Take Back Day is Saturday, October 26th

SUNAPEE, NH—On Saturday, Oct. 26, the Town of Sunapee will once again be participating in the National Prescription Drug Take-Back campaign, the Drug Enforcement Administration's nationwide effort to take back prescription drugs. Medicines that are no longer needed but remain in home cabinets are highly susceptible to misuse and abuse, including theft.

Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are increasing at alarming rates, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. In addition, many people do not know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them away or simply throwing them away – both potential safety and health hazards. The Take-Back campaign, which began in 2010, pro-

vides a safe way for people to dispose of their unwanted prescription drugs

The Sunapee Police Department is a registered collection site. On Saturday, Oct. 26th, Sunapee residents are encouraged to participate in the National Prescription Drug Take-Back campaign. An officer will be available at the Sunapee Safety Services Building from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. to collect your expired or unwanted prescription drugs.

NOTE: If you cannot bring your unwanted medications on Oct. 26th, the Sunapee Police Department has a Medication Drop Box in the lobby of the Safety Services Building which is available for use Monday through Friday between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

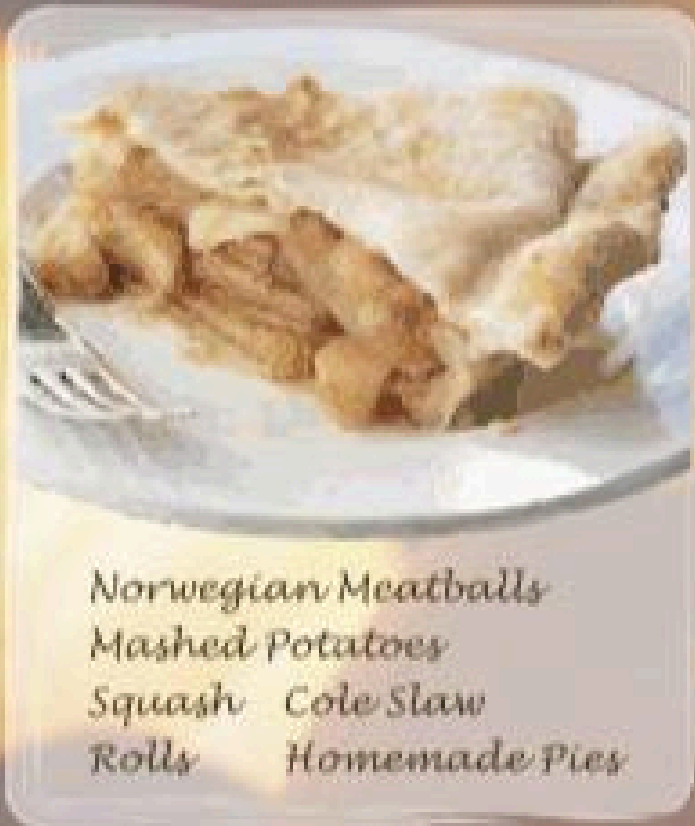

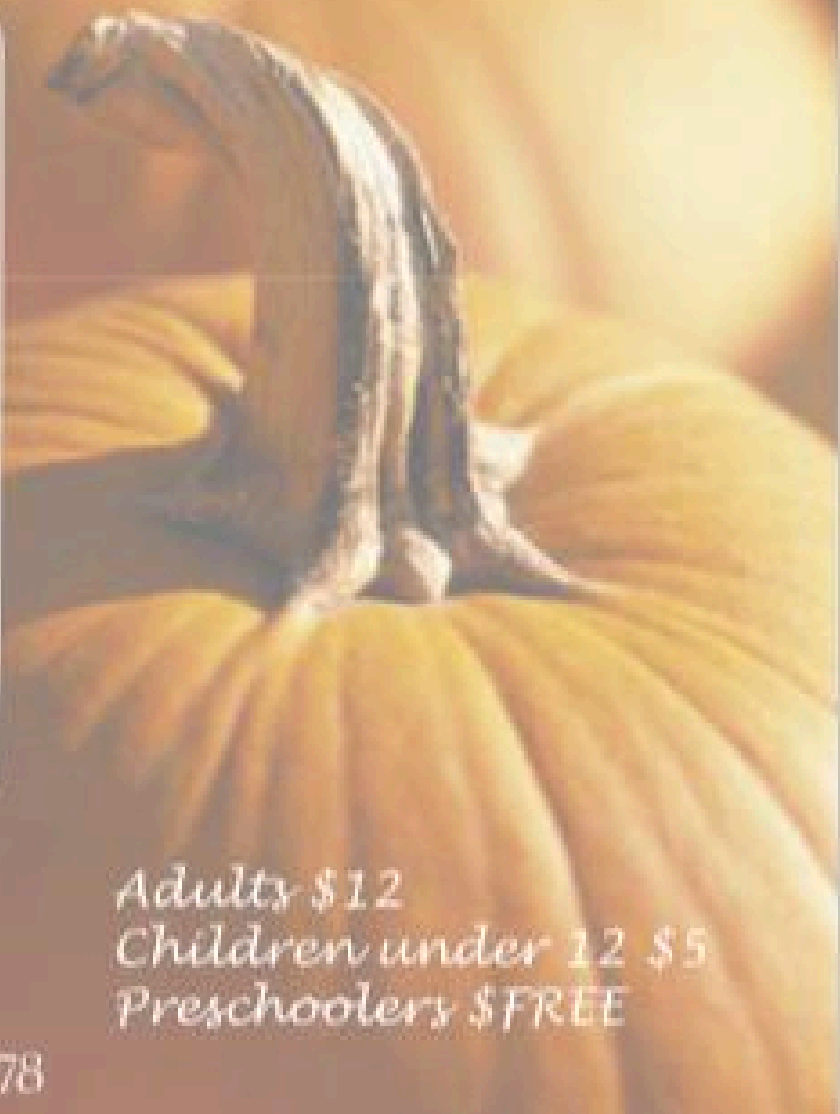

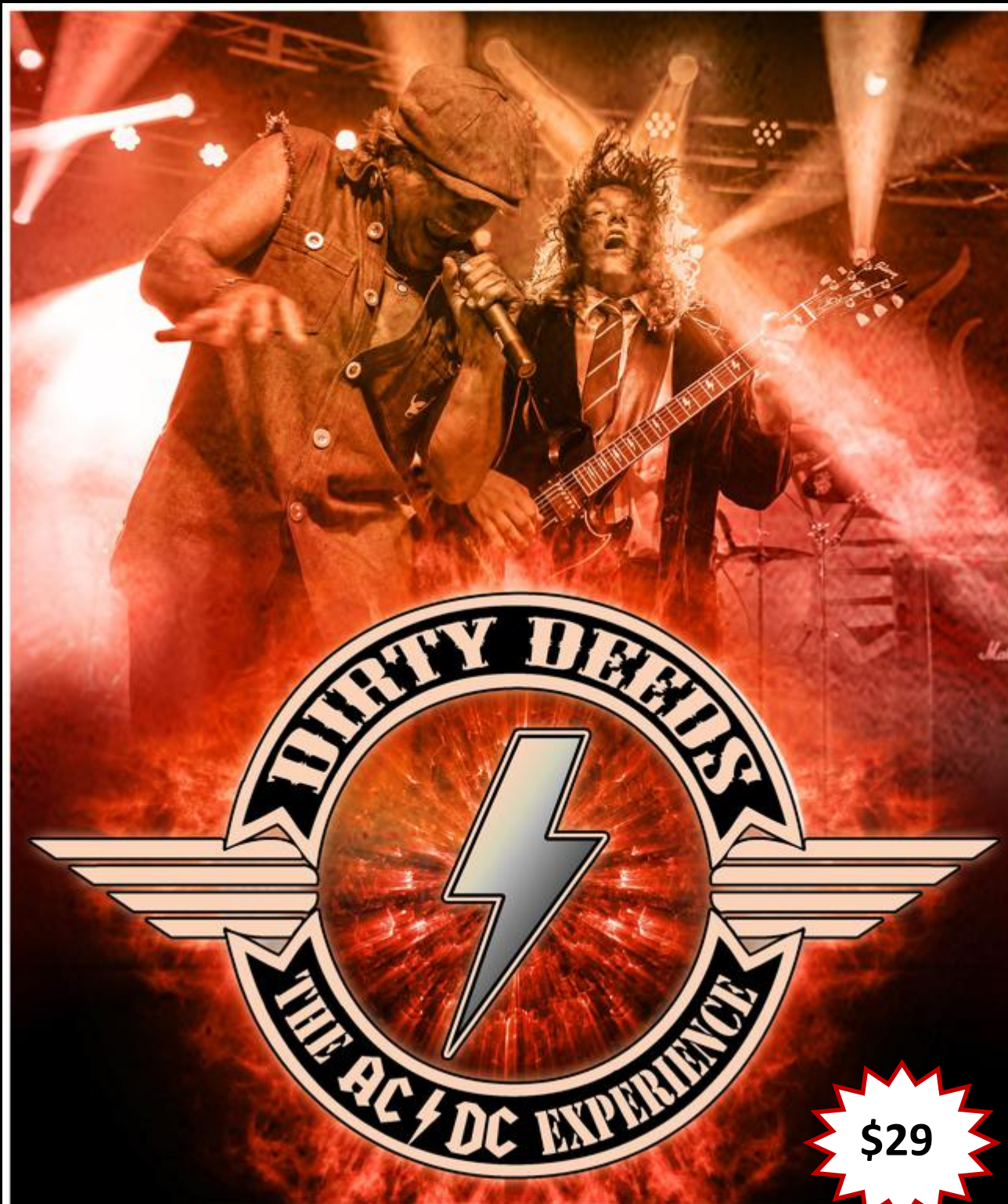
