# All In At Moody Park Mountain Bike Race Returns June 5

CLAREMONT, NH--The Claremont Parks and Recreation Department and Claremont Cycle Depot are excited to announce that the All In at Moody Park Mountain Bike Race will take place on Sunday, June 5th. This year's race will feature laps approximately 5 miles in length with several long climbs, tight single track, the "Gravity Cavity" and the new flow trail. Race categories include Novice-2 laps, Clysdale-2 laps, Sport – 3 laps, Fat Tire Bike - 3 laps, Single Speed - 4 laps, Expert 4 laps, and a separate kids' course for ages 3 to 11.

Awards will be given to the top three male and female finishers in each category.

"We are excited about this year's race," said Claremont's Parks and Recreation Director, Mark Brislin. "We did a lot of trail improvements at Moody Park last summer. I think the mountain bikers who have not been back to the park will be amazed by the improvements from races of previous years. This event offers multiple terrains, varying trail surfaces and plenty of challenge for racers of all skill levels. From narrow winding trails to steep uphill climbs, this course will offer it all," continued Brislin.

"Having the trails at Moody Park has been great for business," said Rob Walker, Manager



of the Cycle Depot in Claremont. "We are excited to bring Mountain Bike racing action back to Claremont."

The All In At Moody Park will begin at 9:00 a.m. with the novice division, with starts of other divisions at about 20 minute intervals. The fee for the race is \$25 for pre-registration and \$35 for race day registration and the Kids' race is \$10 for preregistration and \$15 for day of registration. ### SHS Baseball Has A Busy Week

The Stevens baseball team had a busy week, playing three games, with two of them on the road. The Cardinals traveled to Kearsarge on Monday, hosted Monadnock on Wednesday, and made the trip to Franklin on Friday.

On Monday, the Cardinals played their best game of the season as they defeated the Cougars, 9-2. Stevens pounded out 13 hits, had 5 walks, and were hit twice with pitches, accounting for 20 baserunners and the seasonhigh nine runs. All nine starters for Stevens had a hit, and Zach O'Brien went the distance for the win, allowing just 4 hits, he did walk 9, struck out 7, and gave up just two first inning runs.

O'Brien helped himself out at the plate as he had 2 hits, a triple, and 3 RBI's. Noah Spaulding had a pair of hits, scored 2 runs, and had two RBI. Drew Grenier had 2 hits and an RBI. Brendan Bean had two hits and an RBI, and Henri Bourque had a hit and pair of RBI. Coby Hussey, Login Barry, and Tyler Leahy had hits, and freshman Derrick Stanhope had his first varsity hit.

On Wednesday, the Huskies of Monadnock had the Cardinals number in winning 10-0 over 5 innings. River Fish was sharp for Monadnock allowing just a single hit, a 5th inning single to Zach O'Brien. The only other highlight of the

day was freshman Derrick Stanhope recording another assist from his centerfield position as he made a nice throw to fellow freshman catcher Henri Bourque who applied the tag for the out on the Huskie runner attempting to score from second base on a single.

On Friday, the Cardinals had an early 4-0 lead but the lead was erased when the Cardinal pitchers could not find the plate and Franklin took a 5-4 lead in the 4th inning. Stevens would tie it in the top of the 6th as Trey Theriault reached on an error, and after advancing to second, came around to score when Aidan Cahill's ground ball was misplayed and got into the outfield. The game remained tied until the bottom of the 8th when Franklin had the bases loaded with one out and hit a ground ball to short which Coby Hussey threw to catcher Henri Bourque at home for the apparent force, but there was some contact between the runner and Bourque and the umpire signaled safe, for the apparent 6-5 win. The call was questioned by Coach Paul Silva, and he subsequently protested the game due to the belief that the rule was misinterpreted regarding no contact being allowed with a fielder on a force play. The game is under review and a decision will be made by the NHIAA.

Stevens had jumped out to the 4-0 lead when Trey Theriault, who had walked, scored on a sacrifice fly from Drew Grenier. Logan Barry followed with a single, and Derrick Stanhope, who had walked advanced to third base. Coby Hussey then blasted a triple to deep right center field, and Ryan Napsey tripled him home. Henri Bourque had two hits and has now hit in four of the Cardinals first five games.

Stevens stands at 2-3 and will play the Fall Mountain Wildcats at Barnes Park on Monday night at 7PM, then host the Mascoma Royals on Wednesday, before wrapping the week up with a game versus the Falcons of Bow on Friday.



One thing that we did was to go into New York City on Saturdays to spend time with young people at what were called "Settlement Houses". These were large buildings where inner city kids, just like us, would gather to do homework, have lunch, work on projects and play games. I loved these trips and planned and prepared for them all week. Oh yes, I was frightened anticipating the first trip, but once I got there I knew that this would be an important part of my life. It was.

From the early days in Sunday School, through those days visiting kids in New York City Settlement Houses, through adulthood, two phrases of Jesus ran through my head; "You shall love The Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and all your mind." (Matthew 22:37) "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:39)

It's relatively easy to love God. Loving your neighbor can be a little more difficult. It means loving the guy who cuts you off at the red light. It means loving the gal who pushes in front of you in the crowded grocery store on the day before Thanksgiving. It means loving the men in a homeless camp and the teenagers who are taking up the whole sidewalk who

are apparently unaware of your existence. In short, loving them is the biggest thing you can do for your neighbors no matter who they are and what they do. Remember, if we love them, some of that love will be reflected back

to us and the world will be a brighter place.

That's why I follow God, to make the world a little brighter!

"Everything Woulda Been Fine..."

Part 1

What makes one a hero? Is it performing some grand deed that saves lives? Is it running into a burning building? In a matter of speaking, yes and no. While these things do define a hero, there are other things too. Serving one's country by being willing to fight and even die for the safety, rights, and freedoms of others is one big qualification for a hero. How about coming face-to-face with a bear? Well, that certainly makes one brave. What about being part of a biker



group that delivers toys to needy children for Christmas and stands up for children who are suffering from abuse or bullying? Could it be living a full life with lots of stories to share as lessons or even entertainment for those who could use some company? In the minds of many, all of these come together to make someone not only a hero but also an incredible person. One such man is 60-year-old Buster Brown. One of Mr. Brown's friends who was present during our interview, Kaitlynn, described him as a big tough guy on the outside, but warm and fuzzy on the inside. She also described him as big-hearted, dependable, and outspoken, which we had already found out ourselves within five minutes of meeting him. If you have ever sat down to chat with anyone over the age of 50, you know they have lots of stories to tell. When they were in the military, these stories get more interesting to listen to, and when they have lived and loved life as much as Mr. Brown has, they get even better still. I'm going to share some of those stories with you now.

While vacationing in Tennessee, Mr. Brown and his girlfriend were staying in a cabin in a wooded area. Upon returning to the cabin from an outing one day, they heard some neighbors yelling and carrying on about some bears. He replied, "I don' see no *bears*," and then proceeded to walk toward where the neighbors were pointing, after telling his girlfriend to get the truck and meet him where the people were pointing down a nearby hill. His decision to do so brought more yells and warnings from the neighbors, but he didn't believe them.

"Everybody's screamin' at me, 'There's a bear! There's a bear!', but I didn't believe 'em. So I'm walkin', and I'm walkin', and I'm lookin', and I'm lookin', and I didn't see no bear. Then I come around this bush, and outta the corner of my eye I looked and there was this bear on a ledge. I turned 'n looked, and she stood up. She was about seven feet tall, had three cubs..." He paused and then continued, "This crippled ol' man got him some *gone* up that hill. I can tell ya, I don' care how bad you're crippled, I don' care how bad you're injured, when a bear's on you're a#\*, you can *run*. I made it to the truck. Then I got my camera out to take pictures." I then commented that I would have wanted to pet the bears, to which he replied, "Yeah, at a hun'red miles an hour."

While making the arrangements with Mr. Brown for our interview, he surprised me by saying, "Hey, you'll wanna ask me somethin' about the time I set my mom on fire." Reluctantly, I asked him when the day of the interview arrived. His response, ever so innocently, "It was by accident. Wasn't my fault. I got in trouble. I was sittin' at the table. My dad was in front o' me. I was 16, and it was around 4th of July. I had cigar loads stuck in a cigarette. I was getting' in trouble really bad. My mother was chewin' on me, and my daddy was chewin' on me, 'n my mother reached over and got one o' those cigarettes to pull one out. I tried to stop her, 'n she tol' me to shut up. I tried to stop her again, 'n she tol' me to shut up, 'n my daddy said 'Leave 'er alone.' She pulled the cigarette out that had the cigar load in it. She put it in her mouth, 'n I was sayin', 'No, no, no!' Daddy tol' me 'Shut up!' She lit that up, 'nd that cigar load went *WHOOSH!*... Blowed up. My dad stood up 'n was beatin' the top o' momma's head 'n sayin', 'Yer hair's on fire, Mary! Yer hair's on fire!' Everything woulda been fine... except I started laughin'."

He wasted no time in starting another story. "My wife 'n I were fightin'. We were yellin' at each other, 'n my mom said something. I looked at her 'n said that she can get off my back too. Slammed that door. Started up that sidewalk, my dad's shakin' his head. I heard the door open, but I didn't hear no footsteps. My daddy's at the top o' the hill shakin' his head no. 'N I just kinda grinned. Next thing I know, seen a flash o' light. I picked myself up; I was on the ground... 'N my mom was standin' there sayin'...." He paused, hunched his shoulders forward, faced downward, squinted, and continued, "say it agin! Just say it agin!" He paused. "So I started laughin'." He paused laughing. "She reared back to kick me, and I rolled. My mom was just a little on the heavy side. So she swung that leg at me 'n missed, and landed on her a#\$. Everything woulda been fine... "He paused again. "... except I started laughin'."

As you can see, my friends, Buster Brown is quite the character. Please join me again for more of this man's stories and to find out exactly what makes this man tick and what makes him a real American hero. One article simply will not do him justice.

He was deeply appreciative of the nurses and doctors care at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center as well as that of Dana Farber Hospital.




