2016-2017 Hunting Rule Changes

CONCORD, NH--Looking ahead to the state's fall hunting seasons, New Hampshire

hunters should be aware that certain rules have changed as a result of this year's biennial rulemaking review. Following is a summary of some of the major changes.

Highlights of the 2016-2017 New Hampshire Hunting Rule Changes:

Changes to general baiting regulations: Several changes were made to wildlife baiting regulations, particularly regarding the application process for bait permits and submission deadlines. See a summary of these changes at

Deer Season: The number of either-sex days during the muzzleloader and regular firearm seasons has changed in several wildlife management units (WMUs). See the muzzleloader and regular firearms either-sex deer season dates listed by WMU at

www.huntnh.com/hunting/deer.html.

In addition, the number of Special Unit L antlerless only deer permits was increased from 500 to 750, each with 1 tag, and were available for purchase online only. 2016 Special Unit L permits are now sold out.

A total of 4,000 Special Unit M permits were also offered this year, coming with 2 tags at a cost of \$36 (Special Unit M permits are still available – see www.huntnh.com/hunting/deer-um-permits.html).

Bear: The basic bear hunting season framework did not change, but it was clarified that dogs shall not be run from bait and that bear guide tags are non-transferable between guides. Guides are also now allowed six com

mercial bait sites and up to two personal bait sites. However, additional regulations apply to the use of bear guide tags for bears taken over bait. Learn more about the bear hunting season at www.huntnh.com/hunting/bear.html.

Moose: The number of permits offered in the New Hampshire moose hunt lottery was reduced from 105 in 2015 to 71 in 2016. The Wildlife Heritage Foundation of New Hampshire was allowed to auction up to two permits (the auction closes August 5 -- learn more at <http://nhwildlifeheritage.org/moose-permit-auction>), and one Hunt of a Lifetime moose permit may be issued.

Turkey: The fall turkey shotgun season was extended from 5 to 7 days by adding a weekend at the end of the season. The season will now run from October 10-16, 2016, in select WMUs.

Pheasant: Due to safety concerns, on in-

season stocking days the pheasant season will be closed statewide until noon. These closures will occur on Thursdays and Fridays, October 6-7, 13-14, and 20-21, 2016.

Fisher: Due to declining population trends in certain portions of the state, the statewide fisher bag limit was reduced from 10 to 5. Regional bag limits were also reduced to 3 in some parts of the state.

New Hunting Digest to Be Available in August

Hunting season dates for all game species are listed in the 2016-2017 NH Hunting and Trapping Digest, which will be available in late August at Fish and Game license agents, Fish and Game offices, or online at

www.huntnh.com/hunting/publications.html. New this year, the digest will also include New Hampshire waterfowl hunting season dates. For a complete and current list of all Fish and Game-related rules visit http://gencourt.state.nh.us/rules/state_agencies/fis.html.

One on One: Countryside Chat with Bernadette O'Leary & Ex-Military American Hero, Buster Brown

Part 2

"... 'Cept I Started Laughin'..."

I previously introduced you to a truly great man named Buster Brown: ex-military, biker, with great stories to tell. Today, we're going to visit him again. When we left him last time, he had just been run through the wringer with his mother after mouthing off to her, something you don't do to a Southern Momma. But why am I telling you more of his stories? Why should we care? First, let's listen to him talk about how he was just full of mischief. Then, I'll answer those questions.

"We were havin' a big party one night at my mom and dad's house. It was a holiday. Everybody was sleepin' on the floor. I snuck in, and my dad was afraid of snakes. Mom and dad slept in a King-size bed. I snuck up beside his side. I stuck my hand up underneath, and my dad was there snorin'. Now there was a lot o' real estate between them in that bed. Lotta real estate. And I touched his back, 'n I started slidin' my hand down his back like a snake would. And dad, screams 'Snake!' Jumps straight up, grabbed my mom, and both of 'em ended up right on the floor." Paused laughing. "an' everything woulda been fine." He paused laughing, and then continued, " 'cept I started laughin'." After another good laugh, he added, "One thing I did learn... Can't laugh at her. She didn't like that."

Buster was also in the Marines. He told us about an encounter with one of the men he met while in the military. "We were going through training. I had to train with this little bitty guy. I had my clique, ya know... 'N I picked on this little guy. Little bitty guy. I'd thump him behind the ears when he'd sit in front o' me. Picked on 'im 'n picked on 'im. I mean, this went on for weeks. Well, one day I guess I flicked on 'im a bit too hard, 'n he spun around 'n said, 'If you don't quit!' And I just looked at 'im. 'If I don't quit what?' He just turned around. I leaned over 'n said, 'I'll meet you behind the mess hall.'" He paused for a minute. "After lunch... I didn't even eat lunch. I was waitin'. I was gonna give this boy an Oklahoma a## whoopin'." He stopped, smiled, and nodded confidently. "He come out that back door of the mess hall, 'n he started cryin'. He said, 'I don't wanna fight you.' And I said, 'I don't care. You're gonna fight me, or I'm gonna whoop you.' That boy closed his eyes 'n went to swingin'." Buster shook his head, leaned back, and crossed his arms. "He never missed a lick. And I never got to block. That boy crawled up one side o' me and down the other three times! I was never so glad they pried that little boy offa me." He paused and laughed. "I damn sure didn't laugh that time." After I managed to stop laughing, I asked, "Do you know where he is today?" To which Buster answered, "I don't have a clue. I don't wanna know!"

With all the laughs, I want to leave off with the whole point of why I wanted to introduce you to this amazing man. It's true, he lived a life full of laughter and shenanigans, but he was and is more than just your run-of-the-mill, ornery Oklahoma redneck. He has lived a life that was also full of helping others.

We asked in Part 1, "What makes one a hero? Is it performing some grand deed that saves lives? Is it running into a burning building?" We answered with both yes and no. Those things do define a hero, but there is more. Buster was a Marine for many years, offering his life for our lives and our freedom. He was a bounty hunter for 15 years, chasing down and bringing to justice child molesters and rapists. He is currently part of a biker group that delivers toys to needy children for Christmas and stands up for children who are suffering from abuse or bullying. For these reasons, and because he also gives us the gift of laughter in a world that can be full of struggles, this man is a true American hero and great man. Sadly, he is now in very poor health and could use our prayers. I'm honored to have met this man and had the chance to hear his stories. So remember, as you love others well, think of this man who did (and continues to do) the same. And then start laughin'. Even if it gets you into trouble.

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
