CLAREMONT, NH--The Claremont Parks and Recreation Department has announced that The All Out Trail Run at Moody Park will be held on Saturday, August 20th. The All Out Trail Run is part of the Western New Hampshire Trail Running Series and is 1 of 9 races on the series. The Western NH Trail Running Series is a collective group of trail events that range in distance from 5K to 12.5K. All of the races offer a taste of the amazing natural beauty that exists here in the Upper Valley Region of NH/VT. These races are designed to be fun for everyone, from the beginner trail runner that just wants to veer off the pavement and try something new all the way to the seasoned trail racer.

Showdown in Oklahoma: Update

I previously wrote about an issue in Oklahoma that received nationwide attention. The issue was one of religious liberty and religious protection. A Satanic group had sought permission from the city of Oklahoma City to desecrate Christian symbols in public. The outrage was over the appearance today that non-Christian religions' icons and beliefs are protected under the law from hateful speech and practices, such as burning a Quran or creating a cartoon that seems to mock Muhammad, but Christian symbols are not.

I heard back from Mayor Mick Cornett's office regarding the situation. Sadly, I still have not heard back from Governor Mary Fallin's office. A representative from the Mayor's office, Kristy Yager, Director of Public Information and Marketing, spoke with me at length, both over the phone and in person, regarding the issue. She told me that the Mayor's office had received numerous complaints about this issue. She was obviously regretful over not only the issue itself but also over the fact that there is nothing the city itself can do.

According to Ms. Yager, federal laws prevent the city from denying any religious entity the right to protest or hold assembly so long as it does not promote violence and is not violent itself or otherwise physically harmful. When I asked her about the apparent double standard between rights of non-Christian faiths vs. Christian faiths, she assured me that should a Christian faith request a permit to hold public assembly that is not physically harmful to others, as the Satanic group did (even desecrating something sacred to another faith, such as the Muslim faith), the city would have to approve that request just like they had to for the Satanic group.

Here is my concern, and one that many of you share: Christian faiths normally do not do such things, and when it does happen, there are riots and calls for people to be jailed. One example is the video that was blamed for the Benghazi attack on September 11, 2012. The video supposedly portrayed Islam in a bad light and was blamed for leading to riots that killed four Americans: Ambassador Stevens, Information Officer Sean Smith, and two CIA operatives, Glen Doherty and Tyrone Woods, both former Navy SEALs. After this, our leaders called for the creator of that video to be jailed.

The city of Oklahoma City and even the state of Oklahoma itself are not the problem. The problem exists in laws within our nation that are not truly equal. Ms. Yager is correct in her statement that the city had no real say in this matter. Where then does this lead us? That's easy. We have to contact our elected officials on every level and insist that the laws be changed. Federal and state laws must be changed to protect all religions. While we must be allowed to live our faith and practice as we choose, those practices must not be hateful in speech or deed. Yes, freedom of expression is vital in our country. However, our Constitution only protects peaceful protest and expression. When things are desecrated and destroyed, or words are full of hate and promote acts of destruction, those are in no way peaceful. The "peaceful" part of protest and expression has to return to the public square. It is time to bring back common sense to our nation's laws.

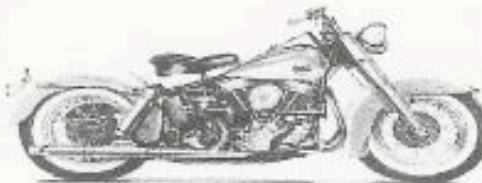

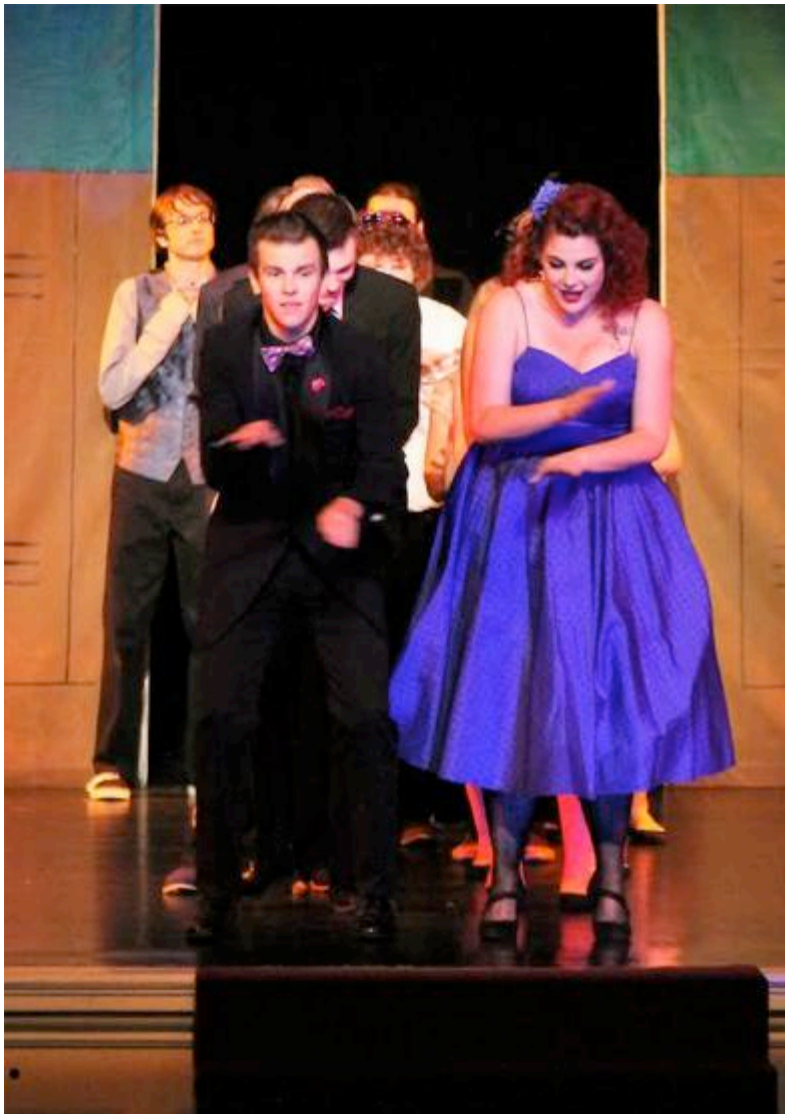
