Cards Score Big Win in Bristol

The Stevens football team traveled to Bristol on Saturday to play the Newfound Bears and returned home with a much needed 50-24 win.

Damon Roy and Baylor Rozzell had big afternoons for the Cardinals. Roy opened the scoring with a 1 yard touchdown run on the opening drive of the game. The conversion failed but it was 6-0. After stopping Newfound on downs Stevens scored again on 1 one yard touchdown run by Joe Desilets. The conversion was no good. Stevens would score again before the quarter ended when Quentin Bicknell rolled out and found a wide open Roy, who raced 35 yards down the right sideline for the touchdown. A third conversion attempt was unsuccessful but it was a Stevens 18-0 lead after a quarter.

Stevens would add to their lead early in the second quarter on a 2 yard touchdown run from Baylor Rozzell and when Lucas Mudge caught a Bicknell pass for the 2 point conversion the Cardinals has a commanding 26-0 lead. Newfound answered with a short touchdown run and two point conversion to make it 26-8, but Rozzell would score his 2nd touchdown of the day, just before the half, on a nice cutback run behind a Brendan Bean block, covering 42 yards. Bicknell connected with Roy for the two point conversion and a 34-8 halftime lead.

Stevens got on the board early in the third quarter and it was Roy again, as he scored his third touchdown of the day on a 13 yard run,

and also added the two point conversion to make it 42-8. Stevens was stopped on downs on their next possession at the Newfound one yard line as the fourth quarter got under way, but turned that into 2 points with a tackle in the end zone to make it 44-8. Sophomore Matt Jones later scored his first varsity touchdown on a 20 yard scamper to close out the scoring for the Cardinals. Freshman Owen Taylor rushed 12 times for 65 yards

down the stretch for Stevens.

The story of the game, however, was the Stevens offensive and defensive lines. They controlled the line of scrimmage from the opening play of the game.


"I asked them all week to be physical and take charge of the game, and that is exactly what they did. They played a great game, and






CSBCC Scholarship Golf Scramble September 21

LEMPSTER, NH--On Sunday, Sept. 24th, at 2:00 p.m., the Lempster Historical Society and N.H. Humanities will host "Poor Houses and Town Farms: The Hard Row for Paupers" at History Hall in Lempster, N.H. The presenter will be Steve Taylor.

From its earliest settlements, NH has struggled with the treatment of its poor. Early colonies followed England's 1601 Poor Law, which imposed taxes for maintenance of the poor but made no distinction between the "vagrant, vicious poor" and the helpless, and honest poor. This confusion led to establishment of alms houses and poor farms and later, county institutions which would come to form a dark chapter in NH history. Taylor examines how paupers were treated in these facilities and how reformers eventually succeeded in closing them down.


