Hike Safe on the Trails This Fall

CONCORD, NH--The New Hampshire Fish and Game Department reminds outdoor enthusiasts to use caution on the trails. In recent years, Fish and Game has conducted an average of about 180 search and rescue missions annually. Proper planning and preparation before you go will help you have a safe and memorable trip, and will help you avoid becoming one of these statistics.

"People heading outdoors to recreate in New Hampshire this fall should be aware that there is already snow in the mountains above 3,000 feet," said Fish and Game Law Enforcement Chief Col. Kevin Jordan. "It's a beautiful time of year to get out, but do be prepared with food, water, warm clothing and a light source, to mention just a few of the recommended essential items."

Resources for hiking preparation, including how to plan your trip and what to know if you're hiking with children or a group, can be found at www.hikesafe.com.

Hikers and other outdoor enthusiasts are encouraged to purchase a voluntary Hike Safe Card online at www.wildnh.com/safe. The annual card directly supports Fish and Game's search and rescue activi-

ties. It exempts the card holder from search and rescue costs; however, under state law, Fish and Game can pursue reimbursement in some instances. Purchase of a New Hampshire hunting or fishing license or boat or OHRV registration also provides this coverage.

Monarchs Open Pre-Season with 4-3 Victory over Railers

WORCESTER, MA--The Manchester Monarchs used a late goal from Gasper Kopitar to beat the Worcester Railers, 4-3, Friday night at the Fidelity Bank Worcester Ice Center in the first pre-season game of the 2017-18 campaign.

The Monarchs opened the scoring when Tommy Kelley netted his 1st goal of the pre-season at 1:59 of the first period. Kelley picked the pocket of a Railers defenseman on the left half-boards, carried the puck to the slot and fired a wrister over the glove of Railers goaltender, Joe Fallon, to put the Monarchs up, 1-0.

Worcester tied the game at 15:02 of the opening stanza when Josh Monk scored his 1st goal of the exhibition season. Just after the Monarchs killed a Justin Agosta slashing penalty, Monk sent a seeing-eye wrister from the left point that beat Monarchs goaltender, Charles Williams, to tie the game, 1-1.

The Railers took their first lead of the game at 3:56 of the second period when Kellen Jones scored his 1st goal of the

pre-season. Worcester doubled their lead when T.J. Syner scored his 1st goal of the pre-season at 15:46 of the middle frame. Syner took a short pass from Wade Murphy off the half-boards, and sent a one-timer from the slot over the glove of Williams to put the Railers up, 3-1.

The Monarchs inched closer when Cory Ward potted his 1st goal of the pre-season at 3:07 of the third period. Matt Leitner tied things up at 4:28 of the final frame when he scored his 1st goal of the pre-season.

Manchester took the lead for good when Kopitar netted his 1st goal of the pre-season at 15:49 of the third period. Kopitar took a pass from Michael Doherty in the high slot, where he fired a snapper through traffic and Fallon, to make the score, 4-3, Monarchs.

Manchester and Worcester will open the regular season against each other Oct. 14 (7:05 p.m.) at the DCU Center in Worcester, MA.

Thanks to Our Brothers and Sisters

While we celebrate Columbus Day and have established Christopher Columbus with the discovery of what was to become the Colonies of England in the new world, Christopher Columbus was not a settler in the New World. He set out from Spain, with the support of the Catholic monarchs of Spain to discover a route to the Eastern markets for spice trades. He did, however, open the doors to the future settlement of what we consider our home!

With all the discussion today about the role of the indigenous people of the land, it is a good idea to look at who they are and what they did. As you're walking through the woods on a crisp October day, do you ever think about the Indian children who played there 400 and less years ago? Can you imagine them creeping up behind you with curiosity for your odd clothes, shoes and jackets? Wouldn't you love to sit and talk with them about their life?

Without the Indians, I'm not sure that the original settlers would have survived. That's not an original idea from me. The Indians, time after time, came to the rescue of the settlers who, through no fault of their own, couldn't survive without the knowledge and support of the indigenous people. In more than one instance, the patient people of the land shared their food and skills with the white intruders.

All the while they were sharing with the strangers, they were shorting themselves. You see, the Indians took only what they needed from the land. For meat, they took only what they would eat, from the fields of corn, squash, vegetables, they took only what they would use. The rest would feed the deer, bear, rabbits who were the original inhabitants. So, while they were feeding and protecting us, they were shorting themselves.

When the Indian hunted deer, they thanked the deer for giving their life for food, clothing and the bones used for utensils or decorating. When the Indians grew maize, they thanked the earth for yielding the crop. When the Indian cut a tree, they thanked the tree for its gift of wood for fire, cradle, framing for shelter. Nothing was wasted. Everything was used and thanks was given for the privilege.

We could take a lesson from our Indian friends. When you hunt, return thanks for what you have taken. When you fish, thank the river for yielding up the fish for your meal. When we reap harvest of corn, tomato, wheat, squash, thank the ground for that produce which it gives.

Off Broad Street Players in Production of "Spirits of Claremont On Air"

CLAREMONT, NH--Off Broad Street Players' production of "Spirits of Claremont On Air" is in rehearsal with show dates set for October 13-15. This will be the latest in the living history series that began in 2005 with the extremely popular Cemetery Walks produced by OBSP and the Claremont NH Historical Society (CHS). This show is a freshly written adaptation of stories from Claremont history told in 1950's Radio Show style.

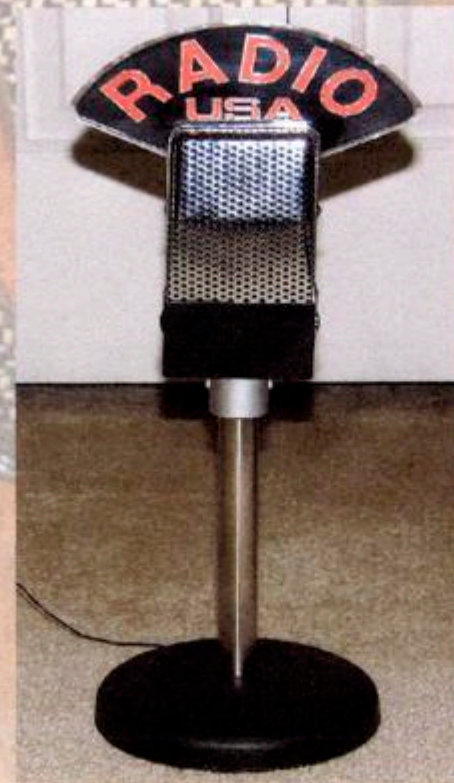

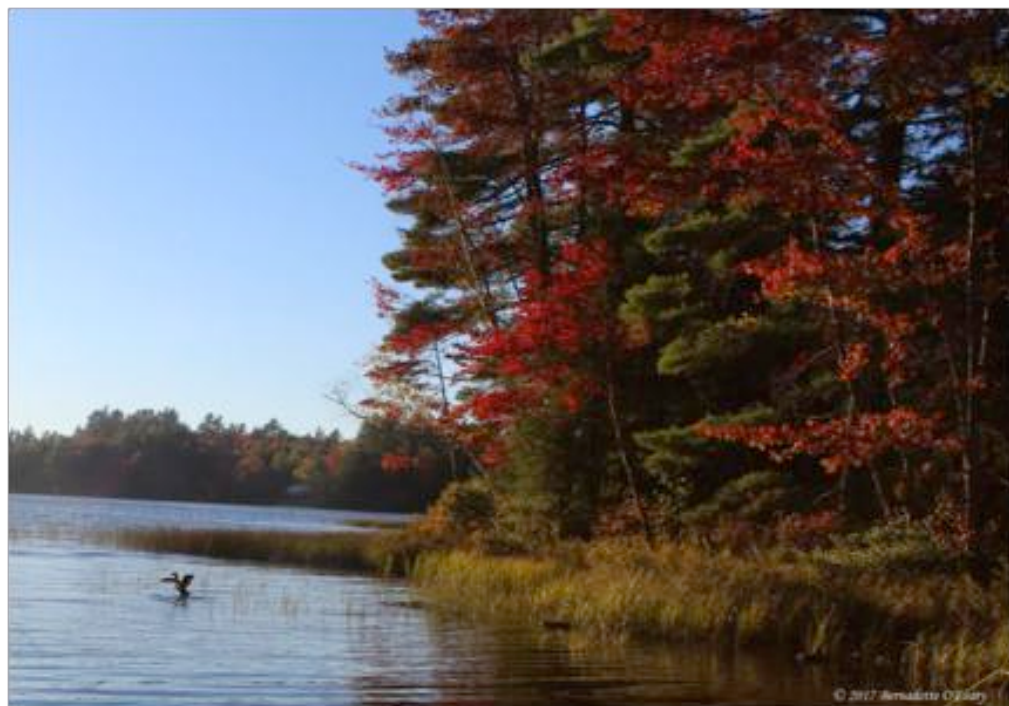
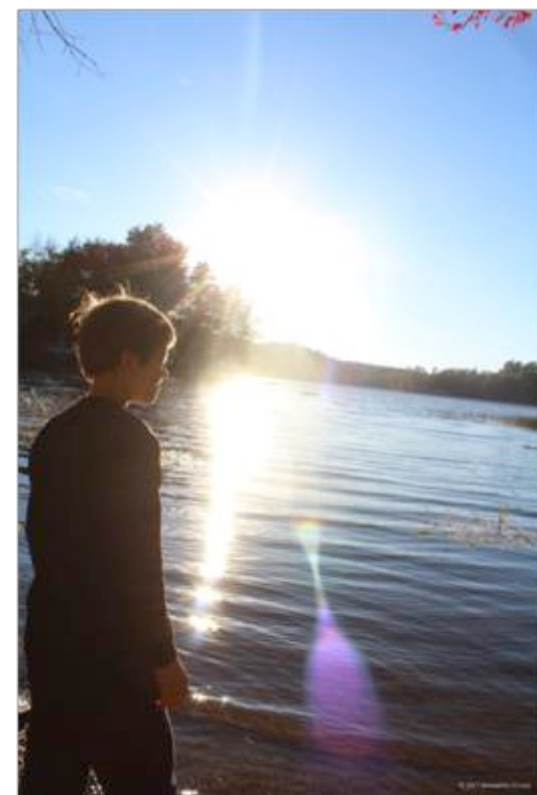
