Coach, Player, Coach

When is a loss a good thing for an aspiring athletic team? Probably never, you might say. But then again, maybe, just maybe, a loss could be just what a team might need to bring it down a peg, to expunge any sense of overconfidence it may encompass.

Stevens High soccer fans can well relate to such a happening. Take, for instance, October 10, 1989, when the Cardinals boys team dropped a 3-1 setback to Hanover High. The Cards went on to win the rest of their games to finish the regular season with a 13-1 record. It was after that Hanover game when winning coach George Merrill cried out, "It was the worst thing we could have done!"

Merrill, piloting a school that had already garnered six state championships in the sport, had a feel for the game like no other. He knew the aura, the chemistry, all the intangibles that worked uniformly to bring a team together. He knew Ray Bernard's Redbirds would become a force to be reckoned with on down the line, that they would not take the defeat lying down, and, oh boy, was he ever right. The two teams would meet again in November in the semifinals and after 80 minutes of regulation time,

20 minutes of overtime, and 10 minutes of sudden death overtime, Stevens would upend the Marauders in a shootout. The rest is history. Stevens would defeat Oyster River, 2-0, in the finals and bring home the school's second title, the first coming in 1976.

Can the same be said of this season's boys soccer team at Stevens? Will a last game loss inspire the local booters to rise up off their stunning 6-0 defeat to Hopkinton on October 20 and propel them to another state championship?

"It was the best thing that could have happened to us," reported Stevens coach Jason Stone in a Saturday afternoon interview in reference to his club's loss to the visiting Hopkinton team. Stevens had dropped its very first game of the regular season and then gone on to win 14 in a row before the losing shutout to bring the final regular season slate to a 14-2 showing. "It wasn't fun. We never had anything going.

It's not an excuse or anything, but we had a little bit of a hangover from the Bernard Cup Game (a 2-1 emotional win). It was hard to come back just two days later. Hopefully, there is a little bit of a sting left. It brought us back down to earth."

The 1976 championship team had Billy Scott, an All-New England player, and Gary Lawrence, an All-American goaltender, as its star leaders and the 1989 squad was led by Cory Belden. Belden was the Connecticut Valley League's top scorer managing to find the

back of the net no less than 24 times in regular season play. He scored at least one goal in every single game he played, including the playoffs, except the championship contest. Of course, you need more than just one or two players to capture a state flag, but there always is that one or two that gets the rest of the team fired up. Stone has no such player this year.

"We need that one person, actually," he claimed during the interview. "We have a couple who may lead by example, but no stand-

out. Ethan Sweet is always serious and working hard. Mitch Paquette is our most focused leader on the field. Noah Spaulding is amazing with the ball. It is amazing how fast he does things. I have never seen anyone like him, but he can't do it by himself. We are a funny group, not a hoop and holler and screaming before the game kind of guys. They are intense, but not

outwardly expressive. That is not a bad thing, as long as they let it go out on the field. As long as we have a couple of guys who keep each other accountable, that will help us a bit."

Stone played for Bernard in 1993, the last time a Stevens squad made it as far as the semifinals. "I'm often thinking to myself,'What would Coach Ray do right now?'," Stone uttered. I think he is certainly the guy who started me thinking I might want to be a coach. He got my mind focused there. His intensity

was my favorite part. He let us know if we weren't getting to the ball. He wasn't mean, just being intense. We wouldn't step out of line. When he said step to the line, you jogged up there. You didn't walk! Stone added it is Rob Johnstone of Lebanon fame who he considers his mentor in the finer points of the game. "I learned most of my running a good practice from him," the fifth-year Stevens coach added, "and having an actual system of play." Stone spent six years as a jayvee coach under Johnstone. "I am 0-1 in state championship play," the Stevens coach laughed, explaining he took over the head coaching job for one game when Johnstone was disqualified from coaching that one particular game. "I'd like to improve on that!"

Stevens assistant coach Jon Root is a direct link to that championship team of 1989. Root was the starting goaltender and pivotal in every game they played. "I wish I could nominate him (Root) for Assistant Coach of the Year, but they don't have that award," Stone pointed out. "We are constantly bouncing things off each other. He loves those kids and he loves the program. He is so fired up every game. He would jump into that goal if I could play him. The kids see it. They love his intensity. It is good to have that connection to what Stevens used to be, through him, through the Bonneau's, or through me." Stone then related the story of Root walking away with tears in his eyes when the Cardinals recaptured the Bernard Cup two days prior to their last loss.

It is anyone's guess what is in store for these Redbirds as they advance into the playoffs. "It was a great way to end the season, even with the loss," Stone stressed. "It has a positive side, I guess. I do know I have had subs gaining more game time than starters. They have had a lot of playing time over the season. That will come in handy, especially next year. Those kids got a ton of varsity game time experience."

Stone and his assistants have turned the Stevens boys soccer program completely around in the five years Stone has been at the helm. Records of 6-10, 13-5, 10-6, 10-6, and 14-2 thus far this season, are proof positive

the program is in an uphill climb. However, the Cardinals have dropped their first round playoff games in the past two years and want to escape that cruel hex this time around, to be sure. The number 2-seeded Redbirds will face a number 15 seeded Sanborn team Thursday at Monadnock Park. Stone was quick to point out Sanborn has played most of the top eight teams in the division while Stevens has only played Fall Mountain and Hopkinton. "They (Sanborn) are not a true 15 seed," Stone said, "and we are not a true number 2 seed. We cannot take them lightly."

Sanborn is 6-10. Should Stevens win Thursday, the Cardinals would again play at home on Sunday against the Fall Mountain-Campbell winner. The semifinals are slated to be played at Laconia and finals will be at Southern New Hampshire University.

"I want to win that first one so bad!" Stone exclaimed, hoping to eliminate the curse of the past two years, including a loss to Sanborn. "Two years ago Sanborn stuck their flag into the ground right here. That got my gut wrenching. I hope they do it again. We're ready!"

SHS Field Hockey Season Comes To An End After Strong Season

The Stevens Field Hockey team ended up being ranked 5th in its division. The Playoffs started this past week, and the Cardinals played last Wednesday in their first round of playoffs and won 2-1 against Bow who was ranked 12th. "Elyse Scott and Jennie Morey each scored a goal. It was a great win," said Coach Patty Deschaine.

"We went to Pelham Sunday for our Quarter Final game but lost 2-0. We played well. We ended our season 11-5. I'm a very proud coach," added Deschaine.




SHS Girls Soccer Regular Season Ends At 9-7

The Stevens Cardinals football team hosted the Fall Mountain Wildcats on Friday night at Barnes Park and came away with a 60-0 victory on Senior Night. Prior to the game, the seniors for the Spirit team and football team

were honored for their four years of participation. Alexis Parliman was the lone senior recognized for the Spirit team. The football team had 10 seniors playing in their last regular season home game. Parker Smith, Zach O'Brien, Richard Bell, Zach Stanhope, Nick LaCaillade, Chris Beckelman, Braydon Burt, Tim Heighes, Nick O'Brien, and Chris LaFont were all recognized prior to the game. The seniors would all have a part in the victory.

It didn't take long for the Cardinals to score, as on their second possession of the game, Richard Bell would account for all 63 yards, as he capped the drive with a 23 yard touchdown run. Henri Bourque ran in the conversion and it was 8-0. On their next possession, Bourque would find Parker Smith on a crossing pattern for a 24 yard touchdown. The conversion kick was missed. It was Bourque again to Smith on the next drive, for a 26 yard touchdown pass. Richard Bell booted the extra point. Bell would add his second touchdown of the game before the first quarter ended when he took a toss 14 yards for a touchdown. Derrick Stanhope split the uprights with his extra point kick and Stevens lead 28-0 after a quarter.

The Cardinals would score 3 more times before the half. Parker Smith went 3 of 5 in his first action at quarterback, with his final completion a 26 yard scoring toss to Zach O'Brien. O' Brien would add the extra point kick, as well. Bourque, back at his normal quarterback spot on the next drive, hit Chris Beckelman in stride for his first varsity touchdown, a 26 yard catch and run. Stanhope would add his second extra point kick. The final score of the first half came on a 10 yard run from senior lineman Nick O'Brien. The extra point kick was no good and at the half it was 48-0 Stevens.

The Cardinals got everybody into the game in the second half, scoring a single touchdown in the third quarter and another in the fourth quarter. Senior Zach Stanhope scored on a 26 yard run, and Alex DeVre scored his first varsity touchdown on a 10 yard run to close out the scoring.

Six of the ten seniors scored on the evening as Bell, Smith, Stanhope, Beckelman, Zach O'Brien, and Nick O'Brien all scored touchdowns. Nick LaCaillade had a fumble recovery, Tim Heighes chipped in with a team high 3 tackles, Braydon Burt rushed twice for 25 yards, and Chris LaFont had his first varsity carry, a 4 yard run in the 4th quarter.

The Cardinals moved to 6-1 on the season and will travel to Monadnock next Friday night to take on the 7-0 Huskies, with a first round home playoff game going to the winner.

Monarchs Edge Thunder, 4-3, In Overtime

GLENS FALLS, N.Y. – Cory Ward scored with 3.8 seconds remaining in in overtime to give the Manchester Monarchs a 4-3 win over the Adirondack Thunder on Friday night at the Glens Falls Civic Center.

The Monarchs (2-1-0-1) and Thunder (2-0-1-0) have now played overtime in two of their first three meetings, with 12 game remaining between the North Division rivals.

The Monarchs opened the scoring when Alex Guptill netted his 2nd goal of the season at 18:14 of the first period. Guptill took a cross-slot pass off the backhand of Matt Leitner, and beat Thunder goaltender, Mason McDonald, low glove for the ice breaker and a 1-0 Monarchs lead.

The Thunder evened the score when Mathieu Brodeur netted his 1st goal of the season at 5:29 of the second period. The Monarchs were on the penalty kill when Joey Diamond received an extra two minutes after a fight, and the Thunder took advantage quickly with Brodeur sending the puck off a Manchester stick past Monarchs goaltender, Colin Ste-

vens, to level the score, 1-1.

Adirondack grabbed the lead when Brett Pollock scored his 1st goal of the season at 8:11 of the middle frame. Pollock took a slap-pass from the right point off the stick of Alex Wall, and redirected the shot into an open cage behind Stevens, making the score, 2-1.

The Monarchs tied the game when Joe Pendenza netted his 2nd goal of the season at 17:03 of the second period. After huge hit by Tony Turgeon in the right corner that caused a turnover, Pendenza redirected a pass from Justin Agosta that trickled through McDonald, making the score, 2-2.

Pendenza got back to work with :10 seconds remaining in the second period, netting his second goal of the night and 3rd on the season. The Monarchs held the puck in the Thunder zone on a strong forecheck, and Pendenza took a pass from Agosta in the slot, skated to his forehand, and roofed a wrister over McDonald's glove, sending the Monarchs into the third period with a 3-2 lead.

The Thunder tied things up when Brian Ward netted his 2nd goal of the season at 3:46 of the final period. Ward skated in on Stevens on a partial breakaway and at the last minute, David Kolomatis lifted Ward's stick, but the puck fooled Stevens, and slid past his right pad, tying the score, 3-3.

Cory Ward ended the game when he netted his 2nd goal of the season with 3.8 seconds remaining in the overtime period. After extended offensive-zone time while playing 3-on-3, Pendenza sent a shot on McDonald that flipped into the air, where a crashing Ward punched the puck home for the game-winner.

The Monarchs are back in action Friday, Oct. 28 (7 p.m.), when they host the Cincinnati Cyclones for the first time in franchise history.


Truly, I cannot express enough just how nice everyone was at this festival. I hope to make it next

Wrap up by describing how your unique combination of experience and accomplishments applies to the position, and how you would benefit that company.

While potential employers want to know about you, as a person, what they're really after is what you can do for them. Telling them about how you discipline your kids or your interests in the "Home Shopping Network" may make you stand out, but not in a good way.

A well-prepared self-introduction will set the tone and direction of the rest of the interview. Take this opportunity to impress your interviewer right from the start because, remember, you can never make another first impression.




