Monadnock had the ball to open the game, but a huge hit by Baylor Rozzell caused a Huskie fumble that Joe Desilets jumped on at the Cardinal 47 yard line. Stevens wasted little time in making the turnover hurt as Desilets took the handoff on the Cardinals first play from scrimmage and raced 53 yards for the touchdown. The two point conversion was stopped short and that would turn out to be a pivotal play in the game.

Monadnock would answer later in the first quarter on a 12 yard run by Chandler Matson.

Monadnock would add a two point conversion run to make it 8-6 and that would be all the scoring on the evening as both teams played terrific defense for the remainder of the evening. Monadnock did have an opportunity to add to their late in the third quarter but the Cardinal defense stopped the Huskies on a 4th down run inside the 5 yard line.

The Stevens defense, led by captains Brendan Bean, Aidan Cahill, Nick Stone held the powerful Monadnock offense to just the 8 points. The Huskies had not scored less than 36 points in any game this season. Other members of the defense on Friday night that shut down Monadnock were Phillip Mason, Hunter Durkee, Tucker Derosier, Joe Desilets, Quentin Bicknell, Alex DeVre, Keaghan McAllister, Baylor Rozzell, & Damon Roy.

The official Division III playoff pairings will be out on Monday, but the Cardinals will most likely be traveling to Somersworth for a rematch of a week two game, which the Hilltoppers won 35-8. Game time will be 1 PM.

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## Monarchs Spooked by Swamp Rabbits, 4-1

MANCHESTER, NH--The Manchester Monarchs couldn't make it two in a row and fell, 4-1, to the Greenville Swamp Rabbits on Saturday night at the SNHU Arena.

The Monarchs (3-3-0-1) outshot the Swamp Rabbits (2-3-1-0), 51-32, in their second meeting of the weekend but couldn't pull off the win.

Greenville opened the scoring when Adam Chapie netted his 4th goal of the season at 14:44 of the second period. Chapie set up a tic-tac-toe passing play when he sent the puck to Branden Troock at the blue line who passed it over to Brenden Kotyk. Kotyk returned the puck to Chapie who took a shot from the top of the left-wing circle that beat Monarchs goalie, Evan Cowley, to give the Swamp Rabbits the 1-0 lead.

Sam Kurker tied it up for the Monarchs at 2:29 of the third period when he and Cory Ward converted on a 2-on-1 rush. Ward fired a wrister from the top of the left-wing circle and Kurker grabbed the rebound and put it past Swamp Rabbits goaltender, Ty Rimmer, to make the score, 1-1.

Greenville's Austin McKay quickly struck back at 2:48 of the third period to reclaim Swamp Rabbits lead :19 seconds after the Monarchs tied it up. Jack Nevins passed the puck towards the Monarchs net and McKay tapped it in to give him his 1st goal of the season.

Allan McPherson put the Swamp Rabbits up, 3-1, at 6:57 of the third period when he scored his 3rd goal of the season. McPherson blocked a shot in his own end, rushed into the offensive zone on a breakaway and beat Cowley glove side to give Greenville their two-goal lead back.

The final goal of the game came from Swamp Rabbits forward, Curt Gogol, who tallied a power-play goal at 10:06 in the third period. Joe Houk fired a shot that ricocheted off a Monarchs glove and Gogol found the rebound and buried it, securing Greenville's 4-1 win on his 2nd goal of the year.

The Monarchs are back on the ice Wednesday, Nov. 1 (7 p.m.), when they travel to Norfolk, Va., to take on the Norfolk Admirals.

## SHS JV Football Team Scores Exciting Win In Final Seconds of Game

The Stevens JV Football team concluded their season on a high note this past Monday. The young Cardinals completed a fantastic comeback, scoring a touchdown with 10.2 seconds remaining in the game to record their first victory of the season, 28-24 over the Epping/Newmarket Blue Devils.

The game was exciting from start to finish. Matt Jones opened the scoring with a 28 yard touchdown run to get Stevens on the board. The conversion failed. Epping would get on the board in the first quarter, as well and they scored the two point conversion to take an 8-6 lead after a quarter.

Stevens would take the lead into halftime as Alex Taylor picked off a Blue Devil pass and then scored on the ensuing drive on a 16 yard run. The conversion was no good but it was 12-8 in favor of Stevens.

The Cardinals added to their lead in the third quarter as Karsten Kleyensteuber powered into the end zone from 2 yards out. Jones added the conversion run and it was 20-8 Stevens.

The Blue Devils began to chip away at the lead with a touchdown and conversion to make it 20-16, and then with less than two minutes remaining in the contest scored another touchdown and conversion to go up 24-20 and it looked like that might end up being the final.

The Cardinals, searching for their first win of the year, had other ideas, however. Facing a 4th down and 3 with just over a minute to go, Taylor drilled a pass to Kleyensteuber for a

huge first down, and then found Jones for a big gain down the left sideline to give the Cardinals a chance. With time winding down, Taylor laid a beautiful pass into the hands of Jones, who had gotten behind the Blue Devil safety for a 28 yard touchdown to give Stevens the lead with just 10.2 seconds remaining in the game. Taylor added the conversion run and Stevens was up 28-20.

The Blue Devils had an impressive kick return, but Mason Mathews came up big getting a hand on the Epping returner allowing a number of Stevens tacklers to bring him down as time expired to give the young Cardinals a very well deserved victory.

Sophomore Matt Jones had a big day, rushing for well over 100 yards and also racked up some all-purpose yards with some big receptions and returns on the day. Alex Taylor also had a huge day. The sophomore had a rushing touchdown, threw for the game winning score, added a conversion run, an interception, and also had a pair of fumble recoveries. Karsten Kleyensteuber had a touchdown, the big fourth down reception, and a number of good runs on the day. Defensively, Hunter Paradis played an outstanding game, setting the edge and making numerous tackles at defensive end, as did Josh Cutler. Logan Steadman repeatedly punished Blue Devil ball carriers who tried running inside on the Cardinal defense, and Clayton Wadsworth, JJ Tursky, and Luke Forrest contained the Epping receivers.

## The Blessing of Rain

As I sat reading on Thursday morning, I was distracted by, of all things, the rain! As a kid, on a warm summer or spring or fall day, did you ever stand out in the rain and let it just wash over your face? Have you felt the rain trickling down your neck, down your back? Do you remember being caught in a rainstorm once or twice and running home, laughing as the water squished in your sneakers? How about as an adult? Do you ever let the rain soak through your clothes and simply enjoy the sensation as you let it run over your face and arms?

When was the last time you splashed - and I mean splashed - through a puddle? I mean, really stomping your feet in the water and watching the water splash up around your legs? How far could you send those drops of water? Feels great, doesn't it?

How many times have plans for the day been changed because of rain? As a child, did you plan a day at the beach and then cancel because of rain? Did some other plan come into effect, like a marathon day of Monopoly, or Scrabble, or Gin Rummy. 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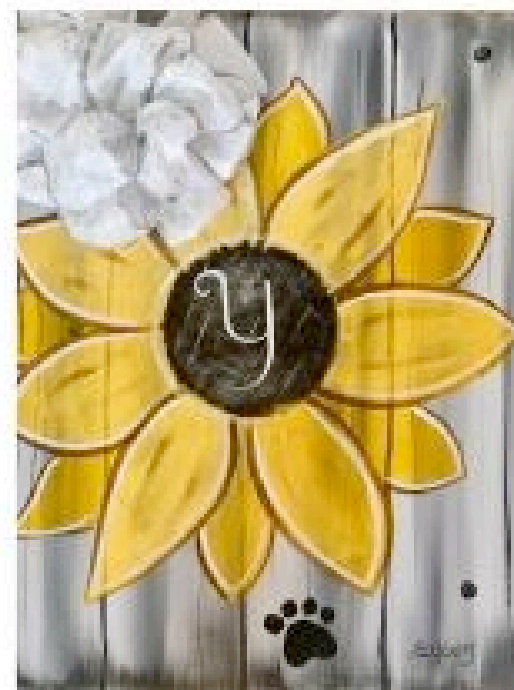

## Perpetual Torment: Living with PTSD

For those who have PTSD, you know the suffering. You know the pain, heart-ache, hopelessness, and the sense of losing who you are and wondering if you will ever be yourself again, much less ever know normalcy and happiness again. You know the feeling of loneliness from having no one in your life who truly cares, even if this reality is a false one known only to you. You know the terror and flashbacks where simply a sound, a word or phrase, a scent, or a place can send you into a hell that consumes you and your senses and spirals like a lonely, dark, and terrible whirlwind inside of you. All seemingly out of nowhere, with no apparent cause, other than past events that have left you scarred mentally and emotionally. This often misunderstood illness is quite common among those who suffer traumatic events, and it is a serious struggle.

The statistics regarding PTSD are hard to come by, as it often goes unreported due to the stigmas and fears associated with psychological illness and the causes of it, such as domestic abuse. Additionally, the cause of suicide is not always easily detected by authorities. According to Sidran Institute, 70% of Americans have suffered some form of traumatic event in their life, and of those, 20% develop PTSD (approximately 5% of all Americans, which is roughly 13 million people). PTSD is caused by various traumatic events. Military service, abuse, disasters, and more can cause it, and it is suffering that no words can fully describe. It is suffering from within of heart, mind, and even body that can disable even those who seem to be the strongest. PTSD Journal states women are higher risk for PTSD, and children also get this horrible illness. It knows no boundaries of gender, age, or race.

It's widely accepted by mental health officials that PTSD is linked to suicide, but the exact statistics are difficult to come by. The reasons are simple. PTSD is most widely associated with military and emergency response personnel and not with the general population as a whole for those who have suffered severe trauma. When added with the fact that not every PTSD sufferer reports their suffering or seeks help in order to allow proper diagnosis, it's simply not possible to know the exact numbers. However, the World Health Organization estimates that roughly 800,000 die each year to suicide (1 person every 40 seconds), plus approximately 20 more failed suicide attempts per every successful death. Unfortunately, the causes vary, rendering it impossible to know how many of those are due to PTSD. These numbers reveal the need for further study into the link between PTSD and suicide that focuses on the population as a whole, rather than simply those in the military and emergency responders.

The sufferer has good days and bad, but the reality for them is repeated moments of terror and emotional turmoil within the heart, mind, and even body (as it affects health as well) with little to no help. In those moments, they feel no hope and see no way for things to get better. For them, things will only get worse, they are worthless, and everything they touch gets ruined. Everything simply gets worse and worse until they cannot face even one more second of the torturous suffering. This is the perceived reality that sufferers have to find a way to work through. Imagine living that way as a regular, normal life. Sadly, many around us do.

Help is out there, using therapy, medication, and other treatments. However, the sufferer often does not or cannot seek help. They can't control it, "snap out of it," or "change their perspective". Life is not always what you make of it. Sometimes, it's out of your control, and your life is spiraling downhill. Mental illness, including PTSD, is not a choice. Yes, there is help that can work over time, but the road is long, hard, and can take years.

If you love someone with PTSD, judging them or getting frustrated with them is the worst possible response. Instead, a smile, a hug, or a short note just saying you love the person can help. You don't have to do anything big; just love them. As awful as it may feel to you, I guarantee you it is a hundred times worse for the person who struggles with it.

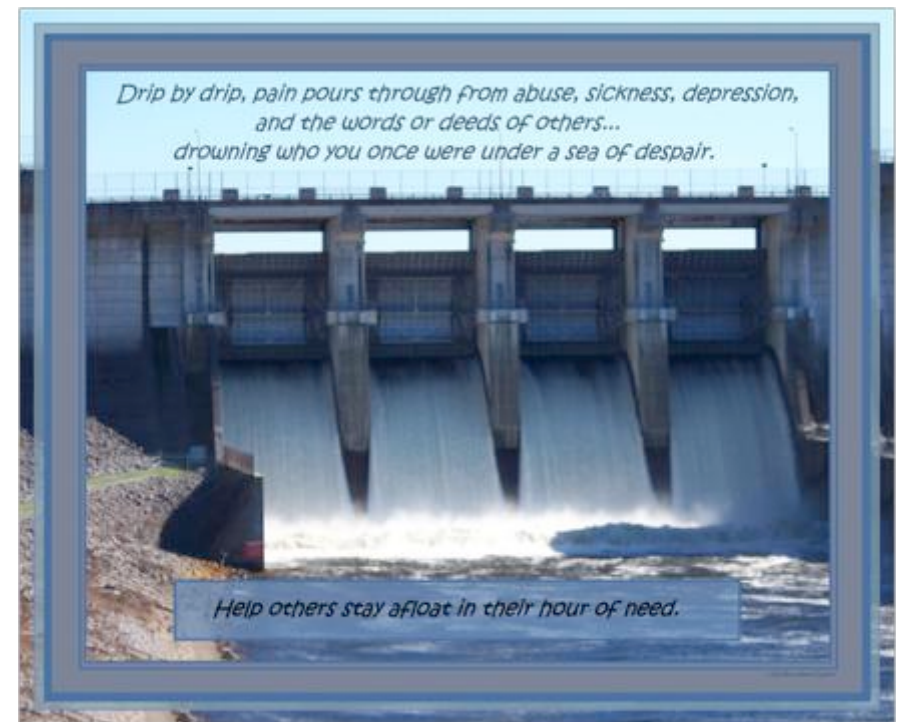
If you suffer PTSD, reach out to those you love. It's hard. I'm still failing in this myself and trying to learn how to do so while accepting that loved ones want to be there. Also, reach out to others who suffer from it. Stick together. It might help to stand with others who understand. Until next time, my friends, #LoveOthersWell, including yourself. May you find comfort, peace, love, and healing.

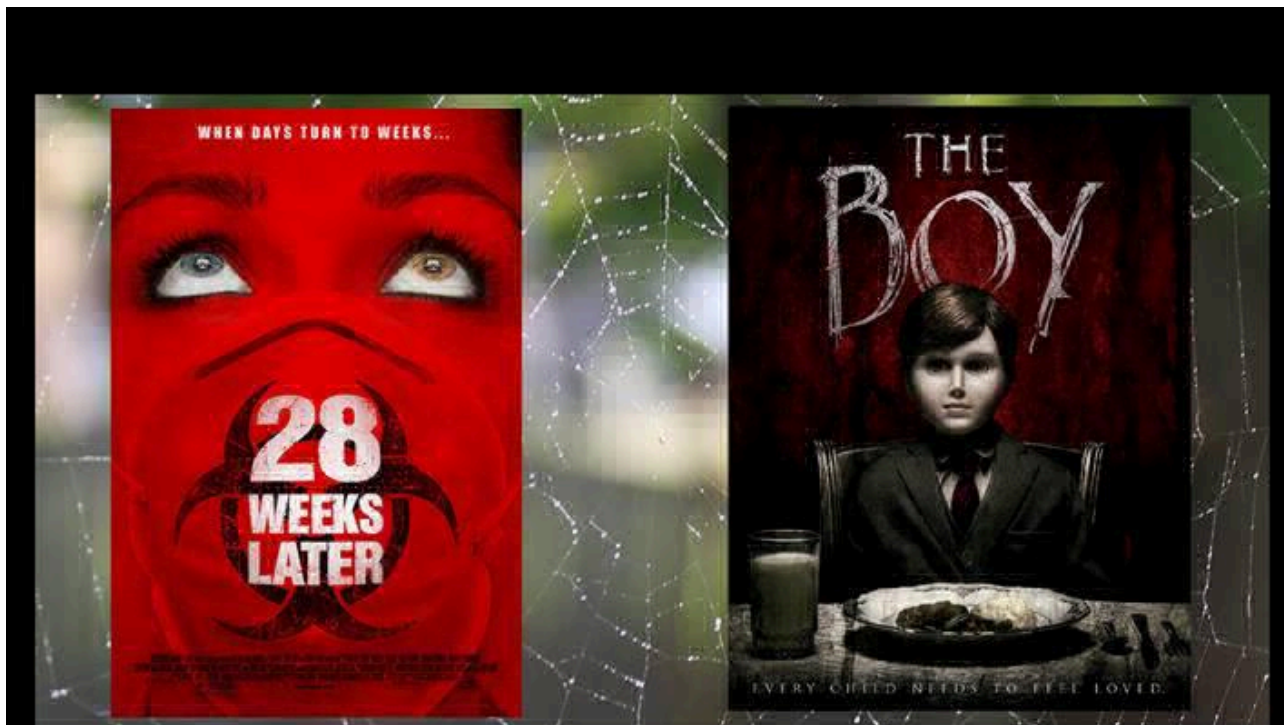
