# SHS Cardinals Championship Bound After Defeating Monadnock, 26-21

The Stevens Cardinals Football team traveled to Monadnock on Saturday, for the Semi-Finals of the NHIAA Division III Playoffs, to take on the undefeated Huskies with a trip to UNH and the State Championship Game on the line. In a hard fought, exciting game that came down to the wire, the Cardinals scored three touchdowns in the fourth quarter to upset the favored Huskies 26-21, and earn a trip to UNH to play the Inter-Lakes/Moultonborough Lakers for the Division III State Championship, next Saturday.

Stevens and Monadnock played each other in the regular season finale just two weeks ago, with Monadnock winning that game 20-6. That game was also played at Monadnock. Saturday's game started in much the same fashion, as the Huskies scored two rushing touchdowns in the first quarter behind their bruising wishbone attack. Stevens would finally dent the scoreboard in the second quarter with Zach O'Brien capping a 56 yard drive with a 1 yard touchdown run. The conversion

failed and it was 14-6. Monadnock answered the score by the Cardinals, marching 67 yards on the ensuing possession to make it 21-6, and that was the halftime score.

Stevens, as they have done on numerous occasions this year, got together and made some adjustments to shut down the Monadnock offense and generate some scoring opportunities against a Monadnock defense that had allowed just 31 points all season. The de-

fense for both teams dominated the third quarter, until Stevens took over at their 12 yard line late in the quarter.

After a 14 play drive, the final 2 plays coming in the fourth quarter, Richard Bell would score on a 1 yard touchdown run to cap an 88 yard drive. The conversion was not successful and Stevens trailed 21-12. After a defensive stop, Stevens would need just 3 plays to march 82 yards, scoring on a 37 yard touchdown strike from Henri Bourque to Richard Bell. Once again, the Huskies stopped the conversion but Stevens had cut the deficit to 21-18. Monadnock was stuffed on a 4th down run on their next possession, by a Cardinal defense that allowed just 82 total yards in the second half, and turned the ball over on downs. After a pair of incomplete passes, and two pass interference penalties, the Cardinals were set up at the Huskies 38 yard line. On a second down play, Bourque dropped back, stepped up into the pocket to his left and hit Parker Smith with a 38 yard touchdown pass. Bourque then hit Zach O'Brien with the conversion, to give the Cardinals a 26-21 lead with just under three minutes to play.

A Richard Bell interception with less than two minutes to play gave the Cardinals the ball. After Monadnock stopped Stevens three times, and used their remaining two time outs, the clock showed 40 seconds left. A miscue on the snap for the punt set up the Huskies at the Cardinals 20 yard line. Two incomplete passes later, the clock showed a single second left, giving Monadnock one more chance, but the pass sailed high and incomplete, and the Stevens sideline erupted, as the Cardinals will be headed to the State Championship game at UNH!

Sophomore Henri Bourque threw the ball 40 times in the game, completing 23 for 349 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Parker Smith hauled in 15 of those passes for 188 yards and a

touchdown. Richard Bell caught 4 passes for 96 yards and a touchdown, to go with his touchdown run. Zach O'Brien added a touchdown run, conversion run, and caught 3 passes for 43 yards.

# Free Wrestling Scrimmage For Girls & Boys, K-8


SPRINGFIELD, VT--New to the sport? Want to knock off some rust, pre-season? Not sure what wrestling is all about?

# Stevens Athletic Director Captures Prestigious Award

CLAREMONT, NH--Stevens High School Athletic Director Doug Beaupre has been named Athletic Director of the Year for the 2015-2016 school year. Beaupre, a resident of Meriden, came to the Claremont school in the summer of last year following 16 years at Newport, 13 of which were spent as an athletic director in the Sunshine Town. Prior to that Beaupre was at Hinsdale for a nine-year stint as a teacher and coach.

The award, presented at the end of September at the annual dinner at the Marriott in Concord, is the first for Beaupre.

"Honestly, I don"t know what to do with this award," Beaupre said while being interviewed at his office at Stevens. "It's a great honor. What's really cool about this it is my peers, the group of folks I work with, who ultimately picked me."

Beaupre, humble in his conversation when talking about the award, went on to say, "I hate being out in the forefront. I like being in the background and making the accomplishments of the coaches and athletes the focal point. If you never hear my name, that's okay. I don't mind that. I'm here to help those two groups. I like to promote the programs the best I can, but I don't need the accolades. They are nice and I will certainly hang the plaque on the wall, but I can't get the accolades without the work of the coaches and players. There are many people deserving of an award like this. I just happened to get it this time."

The Stevens athletic director was hired after former AD Aaron House, unpopular with both school officials and community residents, moved on to take a position elsewhere in the state.

"My first year here," Beaupre related, "I was just trying to figure out the lay of the land a little bit, to figure out what works and what's in place that needs to be tweaked a little bit. I wanted to get to know the strengths and weaknesses of the coaches. I wanted to get to know the community. I needed to evaluate the scenery and find out what was needed for the coaches and their programs to become successful."

Beaupre enjoys involving the community with Stevens athletics and has allowed charity pro-

grams already in place to continue and has added others. He especially has become fond of the Charity Cup and Bernard Cup, girls and boys soccer games adding special meanings to those contests against neighboring Division III foe Fall Mountain.

"I have enjoyed working with Gordon Dansereau at Fall Mountain," Beaupre said. "A lot of good things are going on between the two

schools. We have been collecting toys and raising money for cancer awareness for the children's hospital up at Dartmouth and for the Norris **Cotton Cancer** Center. That was pretty cool going up there presenting the toys and the money and taking the tour. We also raised \$1700 dollars for ALS awareness. The kids are going to remember that."

Stevens and Newport football

teams combined to provide canned goods for their respective food pantries in their communities. "I just want to promote all the positive things the kids are doing," the Stevens athletic director pointed out.

Another focal point of Beaupre's presence at Stevens is his desire to want to include the alumni. "The more you can include, especially those who have a history, you can learn so much from them," Beaupre further stated. "Getting that information can only help the entire athletic program. Combining the community and the alumni and letting the kids hearing the stories of how it used to be under Coach Parker and the other coaches goes a long way in getting more people out to watch the games. I enjoy doing stuff with the alumni and that thing we did with Mr. Fitz was pretty cool. There was a lot of talk about it afterwards."

Beaupre's remark centered on last June's ceremony at the Stevens Alumni Association's annual banquet when Beaupre had the oppor-

tunity to re-retire Fitz' number 22 and present the former Cardinal standout with a replica jersey and have another jersey enshrined into a trophy case at the entrance to the Frederick W. Carr Gymnasium. Fitz graduated from Stevens in 1961 and is the only Stevens athlete to have ever had his jersey number officially retired. In regards to highlights during his brief tenure at Stevens Beaupre is proud of the fact there

have been no ejections from any game by his athletes. "With a school with so many sports and teams and have that accomplishment is great," Beaupre boasted. "Again, that's not me, that's the coaches and the way they handle the kids and promote good sportsmanship. It's a nice thing to be a part of."

On the downside, Beaupre is a bit unhappy with the fact he has not been able to accomplish one of his goals this fall....that of making his presence

making his presence more known at the Claremont Middle School. "I want to get more involved in the middle school," the Stevens AD mentioned. "Taylor Friedman (Claremont School District's Assistant Athletic Director) has been a good hire and is doing a good job there. I'm not teaching here so I don't get to see the kids and learn their names so easily. It is a bit more difficult to get to know the kids' strengths and weaknesses. Getting to know more of the middle school kids can only help once they get here at the high school. I wanted to make a lot more practices this fall season but with seven varsity sports, including spirit, I have been spread a little thin. I hope to spread myself out more this

In conclusion, Beaupre offered up this. "I have certainly enjoyed my first year here. The passion of the fans is there. If we (himself and the coaches) can put out a product the community and school can be proud of, the support will be there....and we have seen that!"

# Scott Fitz To Be Sports Night Guest Speaker

A prime ingredient in the Sports Night recipe for an outstanding event is, of course, a prominent guest speaker. Walsh admits it is crucial to get that individual early. It has now come to my attention, through communication with Walsh, he needs no longer to reach out and touch someone, as the saying goes. He has found his man.

With no money to bring in the big people, the Carl Yastrzemski's, the Carlton Fisk's, the Bill Mombouquette's, the Bill Jackowski's, and a whole host of other top-notch professional athletes, Walsh has had to go with a different cast of characters. Still, it has not once dampened

the spirit of what the evening's intention is meant to be, honoring its local scholar-athletes with a fine dinner and an opportunity for them

to personally and publicly shower thanks upon those who molded them into the fine young men and women they turned out to be. Recent guest speakers, known very well to local sports enthusiasts, have included Larry McElreavy, Roger Carroll, and Amy Zombeck.

In March, 2017, the next Stevens High School student-athletes to be honored will have the fortunate opportunity to meet the only SHS athlete to have had his number re-

tired, Scott Fitz. Fitz, who graduated from the Claremont school in 196l, brandished the number 22 on his football, basketball, and baseball uniforms. The three-sport star had that number re-retired in an alumni weekend festivity at its annual banquet this past June. As is so often the case, the prolonged years of hiring new athletic directors and principals only made the task of making people aware of the fact the number 22 ought to be out of circulation all that much more difficult and the number has recently been used upon the playing fields. Now, thanks to that ceremony in June, there is a new awareness and, hopefully, uniforms will no longer show that particular number.

The athletic accomplishments of Fitz have been emphasized a great deal in the past year and will again be printed upon the Sports Night program in the spring so there is no need to go into that at this time. Believe me, though, Walsh's choice is very much warranted and those who show up for the fete will be very much entertained.

Fitz, always humble, reported via e-mail from his Ohio home, "I am not sure I am the best choice, but I will try my best. I am certainly not one of the big names that they have had in the past, but I am truly honored. It means to me that the St. Joseph's night has not forgotten the past. Of course, I was surprised by Poody's request, but this offers me a chance to give something back to Stevens and Claremont."

Fitz, himself, was a St. Joseph's Sports Night recipient in 1961 along with classmate Carmello Marro (now Tenney) and St. Mary High studentathletes Arlene Pinard and Andre Carter.

Stan Rosinski, then St. Joseph Holy Name Society
President, presented Fitz and the others with a letter which read, "for my contribution to citizenship as well as possessing and demonstrating good character qualities needed so much in every day living." Fitz still has that letter.

"I really do not remember much about the night," Fitz continued in

his e-mail, "but I do remember that we did not have to speak."

Now his time has come.



# Woman Attacked On Trail Near DHMC

LEBANON, NH--On Sunday, Nov. 13, at approximately 5:40 p.m., the Lebanon Police Department received a call regarding a 23-year-old female who was attacked while walking on a trail off of Loop Road near the Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center. The victim reported that a male subject came up behind her on the trail, threw her to the ground and physically assaulted her. The victim fought back and the at-

tacker subsequently fled back down the trail toward the parking lot. The suspect then fled in a darker colored 4-door sedan in an unknown direction.

The suspect is described as follows:
White male, 18-25 years of age
Approximately 6' tall
Shaggy, dirty blond hair

The victim sustained minor injuries and declined medical treatment. The victim appears to have been chosen at random and there is no known connection between the victim and the suspect. The Lebanon Police Department Patrol and Detective Bureaus are working to process the scene and conduct the investigation, which is ongoing.
