A Pro In Our Midst

Every once in a while there comes along a story that just cannot be ignored. I have one now, and I feel it is in my power to pass it along to you. Whether or not you get the full impact, as I did, is not known, of course, but I feel it is well worth relating, if only for the historical factor.

Keep in mind, this is not my story. It is a story told to me, and eventually written down on paper, by Claremont resident George Collins. Collins, age 66, a 1968 graduate of Stevens High School, a member of the school's winter track team and the school's chess club, who lists "Mr. T." (Andy Triantafillou), the school's biology teacher, as his favorite mentor, told the story to me with conviction and total recall months ago. The story has been stored in my mind ever since. The two of us got together early last week to rehash the tale since I could not let it go. It's that good of a tale!

Collins, in his written assertion, mentioned how the youth of yesterday more often than not hightailed it out of the house, especially on weekends, to play. For boys, especially, it usually meant neighborhood games of baseball, basketball, or football.

"Approximately where Burger King now stands was nothing but a field back in the sixties," Collins, who grew up in the West Terrace section of town, reported as he recalled Claremont in bygone times. "We always used to play pick-up games of football there. One Sunday in the fall of 1967 my friend and classmate, Gary Leiras, and I were walking home and a car pulled up and hailed us. A neighborhood friend of mine, Frank Casella, was in the car and he said some guys were going to be playing ball out in the field later in the day and would we like to join them."

They all agreed on a 2:00 p.m. start and, as Collins recalled, one or both of the Kimball twins (Bill and Bob) and other neighborhood friend, Joe Dubois, may or may not have participated in that eventful outdoor grid game. You see, the memory fades after decades have gone by and actual accounts tend to become somewhat askew. But Collins continued on with his story recounting the moment as if it had taken place only yesterday.

"When we got to the field we found quite a few guys we had never seen before," Collins

remembered. "One of the unknowns said, in a wise-guy like attitude, his name was Greg and that's all we had to know. I thought to myself, 'This guy needs his snotty attitude adjusted!'"

Well, lo and behold, Collins went on to report "Greg" had a bad day as Collins and Leiras and all the local boys repeatedly sent the visiting quarterback onto his backside. "I told him early on 'I'm going to be on you like this all afternoon, Sweetheart!'" the Claremonter chuckled. To make a long story short, Collins and the locals finished with a 48-0 rout over the boys from Nashua.

"A few weeks later Gary and I were at my house watching football on TV along with my father and brother and I yelled, 'Dad, Gary and I played football with this guy a few weeks ago!' You've got to remember, back in the sixties the players would come out

without their helmets on and you could see what they looked like and they had their names announced. Of course, my dad said, 'No, you didn't! Gary piped up and said, 'Yeah, we did, and we beat him, 48-0!'"

Collins later asked Casella, a 1967 graduate of Stevens and a member of the school's foot-

ball team, if, indeed, that had been this “Greg” fellow they had seen on TV. “Frank admitted it was, and that after we roughed him up a bit, he never wanted to step foot in Claremont again,” Collins claimed.

So, who then, was this “Greg” so mightily and continually pummeled by the host players? It was none other than Greg Landry, the former professional NFL quarterback. Landry, born in Nashua, now living in Troy, MI, a first-round draft pick in 1968 coming out of the University of Massachusetts-Amherst. The former NFL Comeback Player of the Year (1976), who turns 70 next week, played for the Detroit Lions from 1968-1978, the Baltimore Colts from 1979-1981, and the Chicago Bears in 1984 where he finished his career on the gridiron. He also was a quarterback coach for the Cleveland Browns, both a QB and offensive coordinator coach for the Bears, offensive coordinator at the University of Illinois, and a QB coach for the Lions. During his playing days he compiled statistics revealing 98 career touchdowns and 16,052 yards gained in the air. He was also notable as a rusher out of the pocket dashing for over 2600 yards on the ground and 21 touchdowns, exceeding 500 yards in both 1971 and 1972 and averaged 10 yards per carry in 1970.

Attempts to contact Landry and Leiras, thus far, have gone in vain, but that is not to say somewhere along the way there may come another account of this story. I did manage to get a hold of Bob Kimball in Massachusetts and Casella in Tennessee. They both could not recall the event, but Kimball did say he learned how to play chess from Collins, that Collins was an excellent chessman. Casella, a National Honor Society member while at Stevens and a St. Joseph's Sports Night Award honoree, said a lot of pick-up football was played in an open pasture where the former W.T. Grant Department Store once was located (now Big Lots) and that is where this game most probably was played. He vowed to get back to me with more details once he dug deeper into his memory bank.

Collins, semi-retired after working years in the steel and high-tech

industries, summed up his story with, “Well, that was another first for Claremont...ticking off a professional quarterback. This is a true story,” Collins vowed, “no matter how many times Greg Landry would probably deny it ever happened!”

Moore is a full-time New Hampshire fishing guide, outdoor writer, and the producer of *Tim Moore Outdoors TV*. During the winter months, he guides hundreds of ice anglers from across the country in pursuit of giant white perch and lake trout, and travels the country giving seminars at shows and fishing clubs.

Well, that's just what the old Christmas song says! It was written about 150 years ago. It is a Welsh carol written and rewritten several times until it was finally written in the form that we now know. It celebrates the end of the year, looking forward to a new one.

We use the song now to remember the hanging of the greens, or the decorating of the tree, or the memories of the season. It is a secular song (not religious). It is an introduction to the season, telling us to get ready for the holiday. The holiday might be Kwanza, Hanukah, or Christmas or one of the other celebrations of this time of year. Whatever you are celebrating, it is a happy song.

We will make our homes pretty with whatever is appropriate. We'll get dressed in the prettiest, liveliest clothes we have, red scarves, sparkly shirts, while we're singing happy songs about good things. We remember that the old year is quickly moving by and very soon will be finished. The cold windy weather doesn't bother us at all.

This is all good, but there's more to Christmas and Hanukah and the other holidays of the season. Each one celebrates some special time of hope for the year ahead. Since I'm qualified only in one, I'll speak briefly to that.

We focus on children during Christmas time. Our churches have pageants telling the story of the birth of Jesus. We use children often to tell the story, following the text written by a man called Luke. We talk about the shepherds' gifts and the Magis' gifts. We focus on the tiny baby who was born in a stable because there was not a single room in the town of Bethlehem. His parents have traveled so far from Nazareth.

How impractical and unbelievable the whole thing seems. But we, who are called Christian, put our trust in the scripture. Thousands of years before the birth of Jesus, a great Prophet named Isaiah wrote, "A wolf will reside with a lamb, and a leopard will lie down with a young goat; an ox and a young lion will graze together, as a small child leads them along." To me that speaks of a time to come when all nations will learn to live together in peace, the nations that are predators will live contented with the less strong nations, and help them. We will respect each other. We won't attack nor will the strong take from the weak. Who will lead us in this way of peace? Non other that the baby who was born in a manger, to a struggling young family. It won't be a king, or a prince or a person of high status. It will be a simple, honest person driven by love!

Prepare carefully for whatever holiday you celebrate and remember 'tis the season to renew love, hope and faith!

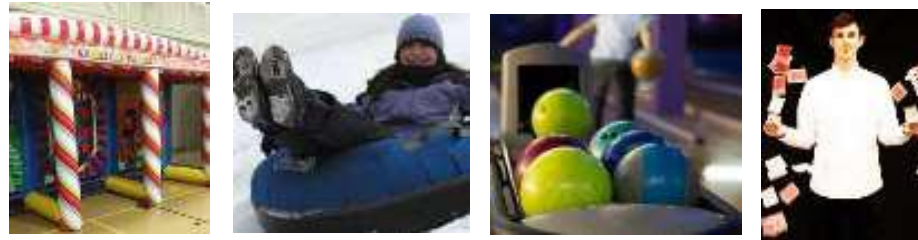
