The Stevens boys basketball team kicked off their 2018-2019 season, as they move up to Division II, on Friday night, hosting the Laconia




A funeral service was held Thursday at the Stringer Funeral Home with Rev. John Loughnane officiating. Burial followed in St. Mary Cemetery.


